### SAFEGUARDING DEVICES

**President Shaughnessy Speaks on the Improvements for Safety and on the Electrification of Railroads—Men Should Be Obedient and Follow Rules.**

Toronto, March 16.—"I have nothing in mind in regard to acquiring new roads at present," said Sir Thomas Shaughnessy of the C.P.R. Sir Thomas is returning to Montreal from the west. "We are intending to do more construction work on the road this year than last," he continued. "The C.P.R. is in good shape in regard to general conditions of the road. There is nothing in the rumor that we are intending to build from Sudbury to Port Arthur. I look forward to the time when the whole road will be equipped with a block system of railway protection.

"The train controlling devices now being advocated are something of a safeguard, the main difficulty is that the men will probably rely too much on mechanical safeguarding devices and mechanism is liable to go wrong. We are always improving methods of handling trains. If the men in charge would do as they are told, and follow the rules, the majority of accidents could be avoided. The first consideration, safety, is hammered into the men all the time. The electrification of railways is going to be a slow progress," said Sir Thomas. "Regularity of traffic and steady tonnage are the first things necessary to make it a paying business. I intend to install it on some mining branch lines soon where there is a steady traffic. When it gets to a point where electricity is reasonable in cost, it will be used as a motive power. When trains are run by electricity, there will probably be a locomotive devised using electricity derived from storage batteries carried in the engine."

### NOT MADE IN CANADA

**Alexandra Readers Were Made Entirely in the United States Text-Book Committee Favored the Canada Publishing Company's Books.**

The royal commission to investigate the Morag contract is proceeding slowly and the end is not yet in sight. It would be impossible to give a full report of the proceedings. The government has gone to great expense to establish that the books were not too expensive and were as cheap as their quality could be secured for in order to allow the manufacturer some profit. It has been proved, however, that the Alexandra readers were completed in the United States. The typesetting and the plate making was done by J. S. Cushing & Co., of Norwood, Mass. The paper was supplied by the Perkins-Goodwin Co. The printing was done in the office of the Van Reiss Press, New York city, and the books were bound by the Franklin Book Binding Co., of New York City.

On the other hand Mr. Haultain has proved that the initial work in this province was somewhat peculiar. The committee to whom the samples were submitted were, in the majority, favorable to the accepting of the books of the Canada Publishing Co., and the books of the latter could have been secured cheaper and this company would also have taken the old books back.

### Millionaire Defends Woman.

Charlottesville, Va., March 16.—John Armstrong Chanler, the millionaire brother of former lieutenant governor Chanler, and former husband of Amelia Rivers, the writer, shot and instantly killed Henry Gillard during a terrific struggle carried on in the dining room of Mr. Chanler's palatial residence near Charlottesville, late on Monday afternoon. The shooting occurred when Mr. Chanler was protecting Mrs. Gillard from the fury of her brutal husband. A jury empaneled today by Magistrate J. L. Williams of Blomark, a village near the Chanler estate brought in a verdict of justifiable homicide, and Mr. Chanler was not arrested. It was on the testimony of Mrs. Gillard

that the jury chiefly relied in finding as they did, and her testimony was corroborated by her four children who were eye witnesses to the tragedy.

### Manitoba's Boundaries.

Ottawa, March 16.—Hon. Robert Rogers and Colin Campbell, of Manitoba, who came east some days ago by invitation to discuss the Manitoba boundaries question, arrived in the city tonight, the former from New York and the latter from Montreal. If Sir Wilfrid Laurier who has been suffering from a slight indisposition is better, a conference will take place tomorrow. In political circles it is not regarded as probable that anything very definite will be accomplished. The federal government, it is understood, will take the stand that as Manitoba wants more territory than is contained in the boundary defined by resolution passed last session, it will be necessary to offer an agreement to be reached with Ontario as well as Manitoba.
