These figures show, for the city as a whole, an increase in population of 63,728, or 60,44 per cent, from 1890 to 1900. The population in 1880 was 75,056, showing an increase of 30,380 or 40,48 per cent from crease of 30,380 or 40.48 per cent from 1880 to 1890.
