**THE EMPEROR
OF SURAKARTA**

There is an empire on this planet
which for strange originality might
as well be situated in Mars, writes
Ernest von Hesse-Wartegg in Sep-
tember Century. It is governed by
two emperors at the same time, and
withal is not larger than the State
of Delaware. Both emperors reside in
the same city, each has his own re-
splendent court, enormous revenues,
armies, imperial chancellors, govern-
ment officers and courts of justice.
Only one of these emperors is
known to the outside world, and he
only to a slight extent. The name
and titles of the leading one would
easily fill a column; his subjects, 1-
000,000 in number, call him the Susu-
hunan, and he himself modestly signs
himself Pakoe Bowono X—"Nail of
the Universe, the 'Great'." In him
his people venerate not only their
sovereign ruler, but also their reli-
gious pontiff, placed so high above
them that none dares approach him
upright or cover him with a glance;
his state ministers, and even his own
brothers, crouch before him with
folded hands as if in prayer and with
downcast eyes.

Yet he is a powerless puppet in
the hands of a small European na-
tion, and may not even receive or
despatch a letter without previously
submitting it to the Java representa-
tives of the Dutch. He actually rules
his empire, every square inch of it,
which he calls his personal property;
yet he may not walk or ride out-
side the palace gates without the for-
mer's permission. He keeps thousands
of troops at his own expense, men
with modern swords and rifles, Ama-
zons with ancient lances, bows and
arrows; yet he is virtually a prisoner
in his own palace, the grounds of
which cover nearly a square mile,
where there are hundreds of build-
ings, the most sumptuous halls, luxu-
rious chambers and storerooms and
stables, with many thousands of at-
endants. Still he has no kitchen and
no cook, his own meals being sent
to him daily from outside.

He is absolute master over all his
people, who depend for their liveli-
hood entirely upon him; yet he may
not trust any of the man, and sur-
rounds himself entirely with women.
Thousands of the latter are at his
beck and call; hundreds he calls his
more or less legitimate wives, who
have borne him many sons; yet he
has no direct heir to the throne,
which is one of the oldest and most
eminent in Asia.

This curious personage is His ma-
jesty the Emperor of Surakarta.

**KING'S LEVEE AT
BUCKINGHAM PALACE**

Quaint and picturesque are the cer-
emonies connected with the King's
Levee in Buckingham Palace even at
the present day. In the old days it
was expected of certain sections of
society that they should put in an
appearance at a couple of Levees at
the least in each season. The present
regulations require each personage
who desires to attend or to be pre-
sented to obtain a card of admission,
and as the number is limited the task
of making a selection is not the least
arduous of the duties that devolve
upon the Lord Chamberlain. Army
officers accordingly send in their
names a fortnight before the ap-
pointed day, and other sections of the
community are allowed at least a
week longer to make up their minds.
Members of the public services, the
Diplomatic Corps, clergy of all de-
nominations, and all other classes
may generally reckon upon being in-
cluded in the list, in virtue of their
status. But private personages must
be prepared to run the gauntlet of
the Lord Chamberlain's penetrating
eye. He is a social censor in more
ways than one. The refusal of an
invitation is a serious thing; but if,
as occasionally happens, the "Ga-
zette" should subsequently announce
that a presentation has been cancell-
ed, social ruin is the result.

At an early hour of the eventful
day the Yeomen of the Guard arrive
from the Tower, and are scattered
about the main entrance, into which
the general company are ushered up-
on their arrival. Upstairs, in the
state saloons there is a glittering ar-
ray of the Honorable Corps of Gen-
tlemen-at-Arms. Here and there are
posted troopers of the Household Cav-
alry. In every part of the palace are
to be seen officials of the Court,
armed with wands, and their suavity
is only the mask that conceals a per-
emptory method of keeping every one
in his place.
Mute officials stroll round the
rooms, to see that nothing has been
overlooked. A final polish is given to
the inlaid table in the King's closet;
then there is a glance to see that the
cheval glass is spotless, and fit to
mirror the glittering personality of
the Monarch; perhaps a window
has to be opened, and a settee push-
ed into its place. And as the strains
of the National Anthem float in from
the crowded Mall the stage managers
retire and the drama begins in earn-
est.

The last piece of furniture to lose
its wrappings is the throne. As the
last member of the company departs,
the holland shroud is brought out of
its hiding place, and is deftly hoisted

left exposed to the sun and air.
