

WAVE OF DEATH AND BLINDNESS NOT YET SPENT

Fifty-seven Deaths Reported From Towns Near Chicopee Mass., in Few Days

WOOD ALCOHOL CONCOCTION Causes Many Deaths — Five Arrests Made in New York City

Chicopee, Mass., Dec. 29.—Search was continued in this vicinity today for persons connected with the traffic in poisonous liquor which has resulted in the last few days in at least fifty-seven deaths and many cases of serious illness here and in nearby places.

Five New Yorkers Arrested
New York, Dec. 29.—Federal agents late Sunday night arrested five men whom they claimed to be the heads of an organized band which has been responsible for the recent widespread sale of wood alcohol concoctions in five states. One of the men arrested was described by the Government agents as "the king pin of the ring." Two of the men in custody were described as New York business men.

For ten days since the first fatalities were reported from wood alcohol poisoning, Col. Daniel Le Porter, Supervising Revenue Agent for New York and H. B. Dobbs, special Federal agent have been working on the theory that the poison which has caused scores of deaths throughout New England and New York originated in this city. The arrests made Sunday were affected in widely separated parts of the city.

Eighty-four persons died during forty-eight hours and scores of others are suffering from paralysis and blindness, due to drinking wood alcohol "whiskey," according to reports received from seven cities in the East and Chicago.

The toll of the poisonous liquor is the highest in New England, where 66 deaths are recorded. Two women at Chicopee Falls, Mass., and one at Springfield, Mass., are included in this list.

In connection with the New England deaths and six reported in New York City, police and agents of the Department of Justice are seeking Adolph Paranel, importer and commission agent of this city, who they assert sold twelve barrels of the poisonous liquor. The police charge that the "whiskey" was concocted in Paranel's store in Suffolk street.

New England Suffers
In Chicopee, Mass., 34 men and 9 women are dead; in Springfield, three men and one woman; Holyoke, nine men; in Hartford, Conn., thirteen persons are dead of the poison and in Thompsonville, Conn., two men are dead. Chicago reported eight deaths; Newark, N.J., three.

In a raid on what is believed to have been an illicit still on Baxter street, eleven bottles marked "whiskey" and "whiskey extract" were found concealed among bags of sawdust. Many more bottles containing ingredients ordinarily used in the cordials, also were discovered, according to the police. There were many bottles labelled "brandy extract." The proprietor of the basement in which the alleged still was located was arrested, charged with being a suspicious person.

126 Dead, 148 Blind
New York, Dec. 29.—At least 126 dead and 148 blind or seriously ill is the toll of wood alcohol poisoning since prohibition went into effect according to statements gathered from various cities.

The total was swelled by 84 deaths in the last two days from poisoned whiskey in four New England cities: the casualties by cities are: New York, 53 dead, 100 blind; Chicopee, Mass., 36 dead, 7 seriously ill; Hartford, Conn., 13 dead, 8 seriously ill; Holyoke, Mass., 9 dead, 7 seriously ill; Chicago, 8 dead, 6 ill; Newark, N.J., 5 dead; Springfield, Mass., 4 dead, 5 seriously ill; Cleveland, 14 dead, 15 ill; Syracuse, N.Y., 2 dead; Emporium, Pa., 2 dead; Richmond, Va., 1 dead.

The deaths in New York, Syracuse and Richmond cover the entire period of prohibition. Those in the other cities occurred in the last few days.

Legislation May Be Asked For
Washington, Dec. 29.—Additional federal legislation to cope with the sale of wood alcohol as whiskey may be asked of Congress officials of the internal revenue bureau. A prohibition tax on wood alcohol was one remedy suggested today and amendments to the Pure Food Law making it a crime to sell wood alcohol as a beverage is also under consideration. In the meantime several government departments are working to stop the sale of wood alcohol as a beverage and to apprehend sellers of the drink that caused deaths throughout the country.

It will be noted by the above list that many well known professionals were whitewashed. Skinner Poulin played pro. hockey in the N.H.L. also in the Coast League and old Manitoba League. Stanley Marples played pro. hockey in the Coast League for several years. D. S. Moynes also had a try-out in the Coast league. Len McDougall is an old pro lacrosse star having played with Toronto Toppmehs and Con. Jones' Vancouver team. McDougall was granted a temporary card in Saskatchewan last summer, but when he went to Winnipeg to play in the lacrosse tournament objection was raised by Fred Waghorne, who was manager of the St. Sommers' of Toronto. The officials conducting the tournament recognised the Saskatchewan amateur card and McDougall was declared eligible.

Great Battle When Selkirk Reverses Verdict of First Match In Exciting Finish

Fighting all the way the Falcons went down to defeat Monday night before the speedy Selkirk team in an overtime battle by five to four. It was a battle full of thrills all the way with one team leading for a minute only to have the other team assume the lead during the next few minutes of play. Five thousand people crowded into the Winnipeg Amphitheatre to see the teams fight it out, and they got their money's worth during every minute of the game. The play was hardly up to the standard dished up by the two teams on their first appearance when the Falcons won out by 7-2, but the condition of the ice was not the very best, the mild weather softening the ice and consequently slowing up the speed merchants.

The first period ended with the Falcons leading two to one and having what looked to be the edge on their opponents. They had reckoned without Joe Simpson however who took a big hand in the proceedings, nothing two counters in the second period and being assisted by Ernie Anderson in putting three goals behind Byron during that period which gave the Selkirk the lead 4-2. The third period saw the Falcons come back strong. Frederickson scored two goals, the last coming one minute before the close of the game, to tie up the count. The teams then battled five minutes each way, the first overtime period being scoreless, but just before the fall of time, J. Anderson netted the rubber for the goal which evened up the two teams in the Manitoba Senior Championship.

TORONTOS AND OTTAWA WIN FROM RIVALS

Toronto, Dec. 29.—In their first appearance of the season, St. Patrick's defeated Quebec by seven to four here on Saturday night, before a crowd of nearly 7,000, Frank Hefferman's team, when the players got into better condition, should be a warm contender for the National Hockey League championship. St. Patrick's clearly outplayed the visiting team.

Holding the world's record for the 100-yard swim, with 52 seconds, Duke is not able at present to cover the distance in less than 65 seconds. Over-development of muscles is the trouble. In the last few months he has been troubled at rowing, and has put on so much new back and abdominal muscle that it actually interferes with his former perfect stroke.

The Duke was not in shape to contend in the Honolulu Fall swimming meet. Nor will he swim in the Mid-Winter carnival here in February, 1920. He admits that he is through, temporarily, but will make a strenuous attempt to get back in form for the Antwerp races.

NIAGARA PENINSULA CHARGES DISCRIMINATION BY THE GRAND TRUNK

St. Catharines, Ont., Dec. 30.—Local advocates of a hydro-radial railway to parallel the Grand Trunk Railway between Hamilton and the Niagara river, which has been promised by Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Provincial Hydro-Electric Power Commission, claim that this district is being discriminated against in that only two of the four Grand Trunk trains which were eliminated as a result of the coal shortage were restored today. They claim that it is because there is at present no competition that the Grand Trunk Railway is not restoring all four trains.

ONE LIFE LOST IN FIRE AT MONCTON, N.B.

Moncton, N.B., Dec. 26.—One man lost his life, property to the amount of between forty and fifty thousand dollars was destroyed and the Moncton Street Railway was temporarily put out of commission by a fire which burned down the Moncton tramway, electric and gas company's car barn and machine shop, between three and four o'clock Christmas morning. Grant Toole, about forty years of age, during the progress of the fire, received injuries from which he died about ten hours later in the city hospital.

Toole, who was the watchman in the car barn, belonged to Calhoun, N.B., where he had a wife and three children living.

NEW ONTARIO MAN WENT HOME FOR CHRISTMAS; SUICIDED WHILE THERE

Montreal, Dec. 30.—Joseph LaFonde, 38 years of age, of Blind River, Ont., was found dead on Saturday at the home of his parents, where he was visiting during the Christmas holidays. He had shot himself through the brain, the bullet passing through his head and embedding itself in the ceiling.

ANOTHER LARGE FORTUNE GIVEN BY ROCKEFELLER

To General Education Board For College Professors and Medical Work

BIG SUM FOR CANADA \$5,000,000 Set Aside For Development of Medical Work in This Country

New York, Dec. 28.—John D. Rockefeller has given to mankind a Christmas present of \$100,000,000—half to the General Education Board to raise the salaries of college professors and half to the Rockefeller Foundation to aid in its work of combating disease through improvement of medical education, public health administration and scientific research. It is estimated that Mr. Rockefeller's public gifts now approximate \$450,000,000.

While leaving to the General Education Board the task of selecting the colleges which shall receive awards for their teaching staffs and the amount each is to receive, Mr. Rockefeller urged that the principal as well as the income be used as "promptly and largely as may seem wise."

In commenting on the gift, Dr. Wallace Buttrick, president of the board, said that since the end of the war it had received from colleges and universities applications for aid "which would practically exhaust the working capital of the board." He added that Mr. Rockefeller had recognized the emergency which exists.

Gift to Canadian Schools
Mr. Rockefeller, in donating the money, said:

"My attention has also been called to the needs of some of the medical schools in Canada; but as the activities of the General Education Board are by its charter limited to the United States, I understand that the gift may not be used for Canadian schools. "The Canadian people are our near neighbors. They are closely bound to us by ties of race and language and international friendship; and they have without stint sacrificed themselves and their youth and their resources to the end that Democracy might be saved and extended. For these reasons, if your Board should see fit to use any part of this new gift in promoting medical education in Canada, such action would meet with my cordial approval."

In asserting that \$5,000,000 would be set aside for Canadian schools, Dr. Vincent said:

From this sum appropriations will be made by the foundation to medical schools on condition that they raise additional funds from other sources. It is hoped that the \$5,000,000 thus employed by the Foundation at this time will give a distinct impetus to the development of medical education in Canada.

CHARGE ALEXANDER MERCHANTS' WITH FAILING TO FIX STAMPS
Two Alexander merchants appeared in the Police Court this morning for infractions of the Inland Revenue Act, when they failed to attach the necessary stamp to some drug articles which were sold. B. Sproston, an Inland Revenue Officer in his evidence stated that he visited Alexander on October 16th and purchased a bottle of Electric Oil from W. J. Morris and a box of Gin Pills from A. D. Blair. Both articles did not have the stamp attached which is required by the special Revenue War Tax Act. Both men pleaded not guilty to the charge laid against them.

W. J. Morris stated that he had never sold any articles to Sproston, but that it was possible that his assistant might have made the sale, so Mr. K. F. who appeared for Morris asked for a remand of the case until the assistant could appear and give evidence. Council for the accused also suggested that, as perhaps the offence had been committed in error, and was an oversight, that one charge should be withdrawn, and the other accused fined the minimum amount. Both parties would then each pay half the fine, and the Magistrate also thought it would be a good way to settle matters, but Mr. Sproston said he did not have the authority from his department to make any arrangement of this kind. Accordingly the case stands over until Saturday morning when the assistants will appear and give evidence.

BOLD BOOTLEGGERS FINED \$1,000 IN PORT ARTHUR POLICE COURT
Port Arthur, Dec. 30.—One thousand dollars in fines was collected in Port Arthur police court Monday from bootleggers who seem to be getting bold in their attempts to get rid of their stocks before interprovincial trade is resumed.

ATTACK ON VICE REGAL LODGE, DUBLIN, SUNDAY

Lieutenant Boast and One Civilian Killed — Intruders Escaped

Dublin, Dec. 29.—An attack was made on the Vice Regal Lodge in Phoenix Park at three o'clock Sunday morning. About eight men are believed to have been in the attacking party. The attackers were resisted by the guard about the lodge, and one officer of the guard and one member of the attacking party were killed. Four arrests have been made.

There apparently was no direct attack on the vice regal lodge itself. The inmates of the lodge at first thought the shooting was connected with some sort of holiday revelry.

As the firing persisted, however, a military guard, consisting of an officer and two men, turned out and searched the vice regal grounds. Finding nothing unusual there they went through the park near the main road. While traversing the centre of the park they engaged in a sharp exchange of firing with the intruders and Lieut. Boast, who was leading his men, fell, shot through the heart.

Civilian Killed
One of the attacking party also was killed. He was a civilian about forty years of age. No weapon was found on or near his body, and up to the present the man's identity has not been ascertained.

After the shooting the intruders decamped in the darkness. The four men arrested were not taken into custody near the scene of the firing, but were apprehended as they were leaving the park about two hours later. They denied having had anything in connection with the affair and it is reported that no incriminating evidence was found on them.

Machine-Gun Used
After the shooting the military brought a machine gun to the scene. This was fired in the direction which it was supposed the men had taken. No one was hit by the bullets.

The bodies of the two dead men were taken to the George V. hospital, where an inquest will be held. Lieut. Boast was only twenty years old. He was mentioned in Saturday's court circular, as having been invited to dine with Field Marshal Viscount French, Lord Lieutenant and Governor-General of Ireland, Saturday evening. On Saturday he had bidden farewell to his parents, who had been paying him a visit.

There was great excitement in the city when the newspapers announced the occurrence. Crowds visited the scene during the afternoon.

In the absence of all official information, the theory late last night was that no raid against the vice regal lodge was intended. It was supposed that an isolated shot was fired which Lieut. Boast and two privates went to investigate. It is not thought that they reached the person who fired the shot, but became involved in a struggle with a passerby, who with the lieutenant was killed.

It is reported that the dead citizen was a laborer who had been treated at a Dublin hospital and was walking home through the park. He wore bandages on his face, the police say. "No official report has been made by the police on the occurrence, which will be explained at the military inquest. The military refer all inquiries to the police."

One Version of Struggle
The name of the civilian killed is said to be Laurence Carey, who resided at Lucan, near Phoenix Park. According to one version of the origin of the struggle, Carey ignored the challenge to halt, and when the soldiers approached, Carey seized Boast, whereupon the soldiers fired their pistols, killing Carey. This version does not state who shot Boast.

Boast began as a drummer in the Lancashire regiment and won his commission for service in the war. His brother is still a drummer in the same regiment. His father, a major, also rose from the ranks.

Policeman Shot At
London, Dec. 29.—Several untoward incidents are reported from Ireland, by the Sunday Evening Telegram. A daring attempt was made to assassinate a constable at Bally Bofey, county Donegal. The assailant fired a pistol from the street at the constable, who was sitting with his family in a bedroom. Nobody was injured, but the bullet struck a bed a few inches from a sleeping infant.

A band of men raided a farmer's house at Victoria Bridge and carried off rifles. At Killarney a constable was shot and wounded on Christmas eve while assisting other constables to quell a rough and tumble fight between soldiers and civilians. It is reported that 20,000 rounds of ammunition have been stolen from the Dangan railway station. The consignment, it is believed, was intended for the military authorities.

IS THERE HOPE FOR REPUBLIC THAT SHELTERS TALAAT

When Talaat Pasha, former Turkish Grand Vizier and Minister of Finance, escaped from Brandon on Christmas, he went straight to Berlin, where he has since been living quietly, the guest of a former official of the Turkish embassy—Talaat the bloodiest scoundrel of the war, co-author with Envers of the cold-blooded measures to exterminate all the Christians in Turkey, murderer of one million men, women and children who, during the so-called Armenian massacres, were shot, hung, starved and tortured. Bloody as Germany is one should think the very London trees of Wilhelm's grand promenade would cry out against this guest of the German Republic.

But no, Talaat has been living "quietly" in Berlin. No crowd of indignant Christian women has tracked his steps as he loitered in the Tiergarten or walked up the ridiculous avenue where Wilhelm kept the statue-portraits of the House of Hohenzollern; yet under the monstrous investigation of this man thousands of Christian children were bayoneted and thrown into the Euphrates, says the London Free Press. Such a barrage of tender little dead bodies it is said at one point, the great river was obliged for about a hundred yards to change its course.

Talaat on the Leipzigstrasse, Talaat on the Wilhelmstrasse, Talaat at the restaurants and at the clubs. Yet no man in all Berlin to raise his hand against the monster who had Christian women outraged by his soldiery and then sold as slaves for any one to buy at eighty cents each. Whose tortures of which he dug down into the records of the middle ages, are too horrible for a Canadian newspaper to recapitulate.

Instead, Talaat, the "Big Boss" of Turkey, Talaat, who rose from the position of a Turkish telegraph operator to be the representative of Abdul Hamid "the great assassin," whose massacre in 1898, of 200,000 Christians drew decorations and embraces from Wilhelm II, this Talaat is allowed to go unmolested in one of the largest of the so-called "Christian" capitals of the world. The thing is a laugh.

And now Talaat goes one step farther. Finished so far as the unexpected end of the war would permit, with his satanic enterprise of Turkifying the Ottoman Empire by massacring every unit of the non-Moslem element, Talaat at this juncture professes "conversion" to German Socialism. Associated Press dispatches carry his confession of faith. According to those dispatches the ex-Grand Vizier and head of the Young Turk party is said to believe that the "salvation of Turkey lies in her political transformation along radical lines."
