Prefers Tariff That Will Keep Canadian Workmen Employed in Canada, and Thus Provide One of the Best Markets for Canadian Produce. Issue is Free Trade or Protection-Brilliant Address by Premier Carries Conviction to Hearers -Overflow Meeting in Hotel-Premier Spoke for Two Hours in City

A convincing, brilliant statement of the policy of tariff proteition was given by the Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen before a packed City Hall meeting on Monday evening. The Premier's address carried with it all his seriousness and power of conviction and his explanation of the policy supported by the Government was completeness itself. That Brandon people were anxious to hear the Prime Minister was evidenced by the fact that half an hour before the meeting was called to order the City Hall was packed to its limit and the overflow accommodation in the Prince Edward Hotel could not cope with the crowds that turned out to hear the first Western Premier.


