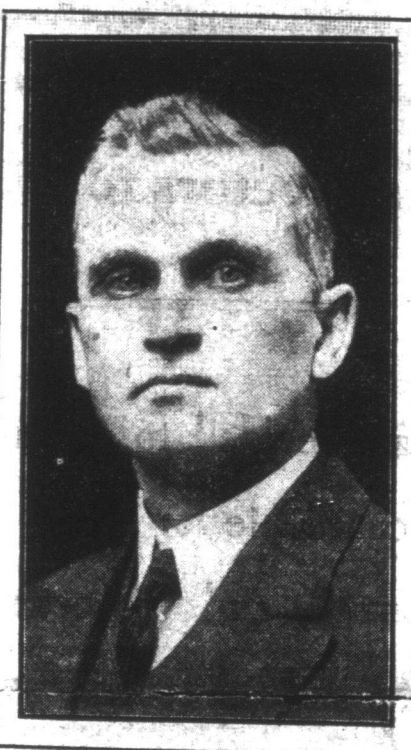
AT THE POLICE COURT

NOTICE TO VOTERS

In another column will be found a notice from City Clerk Brown as to the law in regard to the voting of electors who have votes in more than one ward. The Municipal Act particularly specifies that any elector entitled to vote in more than one ward must do so FOR MAYOR in the ward in which the voter resides, and if he be a non-resident, then at the place where he first votes. Attention is also called to the fact that considerable time will be saved if all foreign voters bring their naturalization certificates with them to the polls.

HOSPITAL BOARD MEETING

Accounts were received and bills passed at the regular monthly meeting of the Brandon Hospital board yesterday afternoon in the council chambers, while reports showed that the operation of the hospital was satisfactorily as usual. President C. Whitehead was in the chair and others present were Henry Meredith, Dr. W. L. Harcourt, J. S. Gibson, S. E. Clement, R. M. Matheson, Jno. Inglis, J. S. Willmott, Wm. Ferguson and Clerk Swallowell.

The clerk's statement showed that there had been 210 patients in the hospital during the month of November. Patients remaining the 31st of October were 83. Admitted during November 127. Discharged during November 137; remaining at the end of the month 73.

The private ward patients were 26; public ward 81; charity patients 20; isolated cases 11. There were ten births and nine deaths.

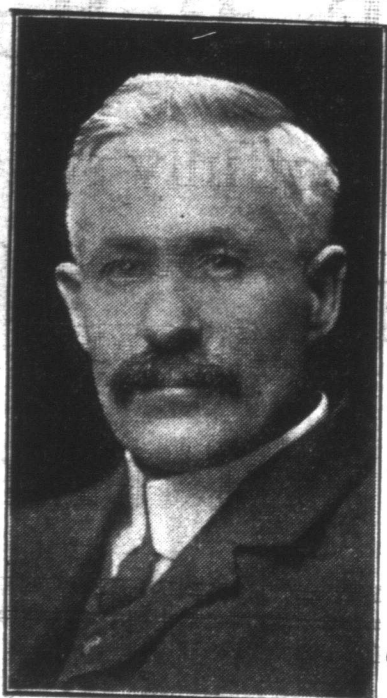
