

## Another Royal Suggestion GRIDDLE CAKES and WAFFLES

**Buckwheat Cakes**  
2 cups buckwheat flour  
1 cup flour  
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup milk or milk and water  
1 tablespoon molasses  
1 tablespoon shortening  
Sift together flours, baking powder and salt; add liquid, molasses and melted shortening; beat three minutes. Bake on hot greased griddle.

**Waffles**  
2 cups flour  
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup milk  
2 eggs  
1 tablespoon melted shortening  
Sift flour, baking powder and salt together; mix thoroughly and add to dry ingredients; add melted shortening and mix in beaten whites of eggs. Bake in well greased hot waffle iron until brown. Serve hot with maple syrup. It should take about 1 1/2 minutes to bake each waffle.
