

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

Races take place at the Roller Rink this evening.

Mr. A. B. McKean was declared elected on Thursday last.

The Girls are in power in the Mock Parliament.

Mr. FRANCIS HARRIS delivered a lecture on the Literary and Scientific Association on last Thursday night.

We understand that the inhabitants of Drumore have subscribed a very handsome sum toward the erection of a new schoolhouse.

LAST Friday's gale was the severest that has since October 1879. So fierce was the hurricane that the steamer St. Lawrence spent nine hours on the trip to Fictus.

THE ORGAN now in St. Peter's Church, Charlottetown, is offered for sale. Offers to be made to Mr. L. W. Watson. The organ cost originally \$1500, and will be sold at a bargain, to make room for a larger one expected in a few days.

The Halifax Herald of the 27th ult. says that the gale which commenced Thursday night, raged with great violence on Friday morning, the velocity of the wind between 3.30 and 3.30 being between fifty and sixty miles an hour. The depth of rain was half an inch.

The following are the Boston market quotations of the 27th ult.: Potatoes 40 to 43 cents per bushel; oats 37 1/2 to 38 cents; butter 28 to 29 cents per lb.; eggs 24 to 25 cents per dozen; the prices of P. E. Island and Nova Scotia mackerel hold the same as last quoted.

The steamer Worcester, Capt. Allen, sailed for Boston last Thursday afternoon, with a cargo consisting of 1,129 bags and barrels potatoes and turkeys, 707 cases of eggs, 922 cases canned lobsters, 100 cases canned meats, 33 bbls. mackerel, 5 barrels glue stock and sundry other merchandise. Mrs. J. Lyons was the only passenger.

HAD we copied the item respecting the number of Island horses which passed through St. John this year, as we saw it in a St. John exchange, just where the Examiner got it, we would have been correct; but we had, it would seem, more confidence in the accuracy of our contemporary than he deserves. We shall be more careful again. The number should have been 1,000.

The Critic of the 26th ult. says: "The Archbishop of Halifax is endeavoring to raise funds to sweep off the debt on St. Mary's Cathedral, so that the Catholics may have a look forward at no distant date to the consecration of that monument of their faith and liberality. St. Mary's Union is the medium through which this work is to be accomplished. This Association has already done much good in the way of almost placing St. Patrick's out of debt."

The Halifax market prices of the 27th November are as follows: Potatoes, 21 to 25 cents per bushel; Oats, 35 to 40 cents; Turkeys, 25 cents; Butter, 13 to 15 cents per lb.; American Clear Pork (duty paid) \$17.50 per barrel; do Mess Pork (duty paid) \$14 to \$14.50 per barrel; P. E. Island Mess Pork, \$13 to \$14; do Thin Mess Pork, \$12; do Rump Pork, \$11; do Prime Mess Pork \$10 to \$10.50 per barrel.

A BRICK SHIPPING PLACE—There were shipped from the port of Montserrat, P. E. Island, during the last three weeks, 32,420 bushels of potatoes to Nova Scotia; 65,031 barrels to the United States, 3,575 bushels to Newfoundland—in all 101,226 bushels. Potatoes have been in good demand, at one time advancing in price to 18 cents for blue and 20 cents per bushel for white. Present prices are 17 cents for blue; 20 cents for whites; from 28 to 30 cents for oats.

We learn from one of our correspondents of the recent formation, in St. John's of a branch of the Benevolent Irish Society, instituted for the relief of the indigent of all denominations, and for the promotion of unity and friendship among Irishmen generally. The following officers have been elected for the current year: Joseph Doyle, President; Dominic Rice, Vice, and James Brennan, 2nd Vice do.; James McQuaid, Treasurer; Daniel E. Morris, Secretary. Meetings will be held on the second Tuesday of every month, the next being on the 14th of December, when all the members are to be present. The object of the society is earnestly requested to attend.

Says the St. John Telegraph of the 24th ult.: "Mr. and Mrs. Beales, of P. E. Island, boarded the train yesterday, at Pains Junction with their daughter, a girl of 17 years, who has lost her reason. The circumstances of the case are very sad. Last summer the brother of Miss Beales was suspected of being one of the two young men who wanted shot a youth while driving along one of the highways in the Island. The officers of the law followed young Beales to his home and there arrested him in the presence of his sister. The girl was so terrified by the arrest and trial of her brother that from that time to the present day she has been out of her mind. Finding that she could not be cured on the island her parents resolved to take her to eminent practitioners in Boston, and for that purpose proceeded there last evening by the western train. The unfortunate condition of the afflicted young girl on the station platform was very pitiful to hear and her parents, when an attendant was in the smoking compartment of the train, during the run to the city. Her brother, who was accused of the crime, was tried and acquitted."
