Morris Government Worst on Record

On two occasions within the past fifteen years a cry has been made for a change from the Liberal Government of the day. The first was that of 1897. Hardly had the new administration taken seats in their offices when the public at large began to wonder whether or not they had made a mistake. Before much time had elapsed they were convinced that a serious blunder had been made, which would leave behind mischiefs that were in part irremediable. An opportunity to test the feelings of the country was afforded before the usual statutory time, and every district in the island, except two, sent back the Liberal party to power with 32 men out of 56 in the House of Assembly, a unique pronouncement in the history of the Colony and an index of the determination of the electorate to remedy the blunder of 1897 if possible.

A period of almost twelve years passed from the commission of the error of 1897, when the country was again beguiled by a cry for a change. After another trial of the Tory party of some two and a half years, the country finds it has made another blunder, and a quiet determined feeling prevails that at the next general election the Morris party will be buried from power by a vote as decisive as that which turned down the Morris party in 1900. It is conceded to-day very generally that if there was a general election this fall the Morris party would not have a ghost of a chance.

In his last issue the editor of the Fisherman's Advocate declares that no man was prouder of the success of Sir Edward Morris at the general election of 1909 than he was, but that now he has no hesitation in saying that the worst government that ever ruled this Colony is the government in power to-day.

In this opinion he is not alone. We believe it is the opinion which prevails predominantly throughout the Colony. The electorate made a blunder in 1897. The mending of the mischief was a most costly business. The electorate blundered again in 1909. Let us hope that the reparation of the mischievous policy of a carnival of extravagance may not be fatal to our autonomy. If it goes on much longer, the remedy may not be wholly in our own hands.

Forest Fires Destroy Houses.

For several days past forest fires have been raging in the neighbourhood of Flatrock, and yesterday it swept down near the settlement. For a long while during the forenoon it burned steadily nearer and nearer a house occupied by an old woman named Kennedy and her daughter, Mrs. Power, whose husband is away poeie fishing. All the men of the place were out fighting and the police were telephoned for assistance. Constables Lawlor, Lee and Frampton were sent forward by Inspector General Sullivan and went on their way quickly, but about half an hour before they reached the place the flames seized on the structure, there was no one about to render aid and it was quickly razed to the ground. The two women had all they could do to get out the furniture and effects, but most of what was in the house was destroyed. The loss is a great one to these unfortunate people. Had the officers got word of the danger about an hour before they would have anticipated the fire and would likely have saved the household for the unfortunate people, who are now sheltered by friends. As far as we can hear there is no insurance on the premises.

Police Court News.

To-day a disorderly, who also broke some glass in the windows of the cells at the police station, was fined \$5 or 14 days. Another disorderly, who violently resisted arrest, was fined \$4 or 14 days. A drunk, the second time this season, was fined \$2 or 7 days. The Beothic's Report.

The Beothic reports that the Minto and Jessie C. Thomey must have got down to Hudson Bay O. K. as she passed them off Cape Chidleigh in the lee. It is thought they reached Port Nelson. The Beothic brought up from Hudson Bay Mr. and Mrs. Snipe, who are in the employ of the Hudson Bay Co. and bound home to the Old Country; R. H. McNeill, Mr. Church, an American sportsman, and his servant, and Billy Morrison, his guide. The people speak in glowing terms of the country and Hudson Bay. The soil is very fertile, yielding all kinds of cereals, and the new railway has been contracted for by McArthur & Co. and will be 410 miles in length. There are a number of men at work on it now and it will be finished in 4 years. It is a fine land for cattle raising also, and it will be open for steamers from July to November and for trains all the year round. Mr. McNeill is photographer for the Canadian Government and has been down there four years.

The Stephano Here.

The S.S. Stephano, Capt. Clarke, arrived here at 2.30 this morning. She left New York on Saturday last, arrived at Halifax on Monday, left Tuesday at 3 p.m. and arrived in port as stated above. She had little fog on the voyage to Halifax, but grand weather from that port to this. She brought a three quarter cargo and 160 passengers, all round trippers, and 20 second class. Some of the round trippers will go to Montreal on the Rosalind and thence will proceed to their homes in the United States.

Going to Hudson's Bay.

Mr. John Healey, an experienced foreman of section workers, who has been with the Reid Nfld. Co. for many years, will leave by the Stephano for Hudson's Bay, taking 25 men—mostly from Harbor Main—with him for the erection of a large pulp mill. The men are under agreement to receive 30 cents per hour at the work.

Power of Electricity.

Effect of Electricity on School Children.

A rather remarkable experiment has been arranged for some years in one of the public schools of Stockholm, Sweden, to test the beneficial influence of electricity on the development of the human body. Two groups each of twenty-five children, as nearly alike as possible in general health and in the size and weight of the individuals, were given instruction in two rooms, both being equal in size, ventilation, lighting and exposure. But the group in one of the rooms was continually exposed to the influence of electric currents, while the other group was not.

Now, after three or four years of the tests, it is claimed that the "electricified" children have outstripped the other group, growing faster, putting on weight quicker, developing better appetites and showing more physical resistance. As a whole, the mentality of the electrified group was the greater, as backwardness in the majority of cases is the result of some physical defect.

Oiled Paper Umbrellas Of the Japanese.

The umbrellas used by the Japanese are similar in all respects to the paper parasols that are common in this country, except that the Japanese treat their material with a vegetable oil which renders it impervious to moisture. The oil is obtained from the seeds of a plant (Perilla ocimoides) cultivated in some parts of Japan. A bushel of the seed produces about a gallon of oil, and the crop amounts to 250,000 bushels annually. The oil is boiled and, when cool, is applied to the paper umbrellas with a piece of cloth or waste. The umbrellas are then exposed to the sun for five hours.

The oiled paper is also used in making lanterns and for window panes. The paper lantern is in common use in Japan for lights on rickshaws and wagons, and as a hand lantern like the tin lanterns here. Oiled paper is used instead of window glass in practically all of the native houses throughout the empire.

The west bound express arrived at Port aux Basques at 12.45 p.m. to-day. The incoming express arrived here at 1.40 p.m. to-day.

Here and There.

FISHERMEN PICKED UP. — Two American fishermen who got astray from their schooner and landed at Savage Island, and who were in their dory two nights and days, were brought up by the Solway and are being looked after by the American Consul. They had grub but were nearly frozen with the cold.

BANKERS IN PORT. — The Lamenburg bankers Itasca, with 1,650 qts. of fish; Donald L. Silver, with 1,400; Burnett, C. J. 1,000; and Farnham, 1,300 qts., all arrived in port last evening for salt, supplies, ice and squid. Messrs. Job Bros. & Co. are looking after them. They report very little fish on the Nova Scotia Bank.
