Exclusive Concession for Fifteen Years.

BOOTH CO'S. N. F. CONCESSIONS.

The Booth Fisheries Co., through negotiations with Sir Edward Morris, Premier of Newfoundland, has completed arrangements for an extension in its salt water fish business. The programme involves the formation of a company to be known as the Newfoundland Fisheries Co., with a capital of \$1,000,000 or more, the stock of which is to be held by the Booth Fisheries Co.

Contracts have been drawn up with the Colonial Government for concessions, subject to examination of the properties by agents of the Booth Fisheries Co. Their fishing fleet has started on an experimental trip to Newfoundland to make preliminary investigations. The Newfoundland Government has never sold an ounce of bait or ice to foreigners, and the satisfactory terms of the contracts made with the Booth Fisheries Co.

give that company the exclusive concession for fifteen years for these vital materials.

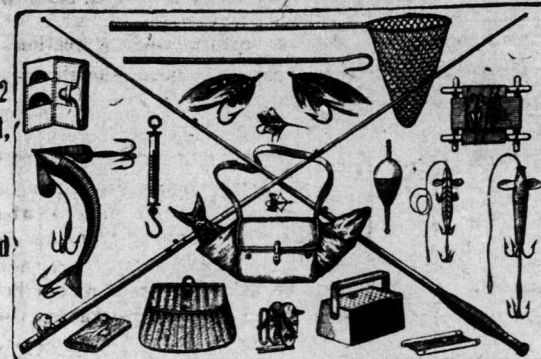
The contracts admit free of duty all construction materials, ammonia for freezing purposes, oils and everything the company will require in the transaction of its business. It also includes the furnishing of water power for the operation of the plants wherever government land is available, and to the Booth Fisheries Co. a perpetual grant is given for each twenty square miles for each plant built. The company, as soon as satisfactory reports are received, will commence the erection of the two large cold storage plants and stations—one at Port au Basque on the southwest coast, and one at St. John's. The explanation of the extraordinarily favorable terms lies in the fact that the colony is eager to develop its great fishing industry. —The Fishing Gazette, N.Y., June 22nd, 1912.

Bait Concession To Foreigners.

THE PRIME MINISTER SHOULD
TELL HIS PEOPLE WHAT HE
HAS BEEN DOING WITH THEIR
BAIT WHILE HE HAS BEEN
AWAY.

In the issue of the Fishing Gazette of New York of June 22nd, we find the following editorial note:

"The trade has been deeply interested in reports circulated for several weeks of a concession to the Booth Fisheries Co. by the Newfoundland Government through Premier Morris. This has been confirmed. We give a synopsis of the arrangements on another page, the first of the kind ever granted by Newfoundland. The company has already commenced preliminary investigation by sending several of their fishing vessels to Newfoundland."

On turning to the synopsis referred to, which we publish elsewhere in this issue, we find the terms granted to the Newfoundland Fisheries Co. the stock of which is to be held by the Booth Fisheries Co., referred to as "extraordinary favourable."

Now what are the terms which are referred to as extraordinary favourable? We venture to prophesy that Newfoundlanders will open their eyes wider when they read what the N. Y. Fishing Gazette states them. This is how it is put:

"The Newfoundland Government has never sold an ounce of bait or ice to foreigners, and the satisfactory terms of the contracts made with the Booth Fisheries Co. give that company the EXCLUSIVE CONCESSION FOR FIFTEEN YEARS FOR THESE VITAL MATERIALS."

Bad as we contended the Trefethen and Lord contract was in regard to its provision about ice and bait, this appears infinitely worse. The American Fishing Gazette considers this American Company has obtained terms extraordinarily favourable to them—the first of the kind ever granted by Newfoundland. How will Newfoundland fishermen, suppliers and merchants regard this? Are they likely to look upon them as extraordinarily unfavourable to them? It is high time the exact terms of this agreement, negotiated by Sir E. P. Morris, between the Government and the Booth Fisheries Co. be made public. Newfoundland ought to know where she is in these matters which vitally affect her staple industry.
