Man Dangerously Wounded.

Mr. Chas. Moakler, of 36 Codner's Lane, received a wound last evening which came near causing his death. He is a cooper by trade and worked last week and for some time on Franklin's premises. Last evening after having taken some drink he went to the wharf and had a dispute with a man named Cantwell, whom another, a laborer named Connors, so Moakler alleges, interfered, and a general fracas occurred. In the melee Moakler received a severe wound in the back and does not know if he fell against a sharp adze which is possible, or whether he was stabbed with a knife. Anyhow whatever instrument it was it cut through his coat and vest and inner clothing and the wound received was deep and dangerous. The man then went home, but did not seem to suffer pain and only once complained to his wife that his back hurt him. He partook of tea and then went to the police station to report the matter, but being under the influence of drink and as there was then no sign of blood about him the matter was considered a trivial affair and he left the lockup going to Mr. John Keane's shoe store on Adelaide Street. Here a friend named Wakeham noticed that the man's clothing was saturated with blood and assisted him home, where Dr. O'Connell, on being phoned for, promptly attended him and put several stitches in the wound. When the man arrived home it was seen that he was bleeding copiously and the chair on which he sat and the door which he rubbed against were smeared with blood. The doctor said that if the wound had gone another 1/2 inch the principal artery would have been cut and he might have lost his life. The police were then informed of the seriousness of the affair and after getting Moakler's statement Head Feet and Sergt. Noseworthy arrested Connors at the Casino Theatre. A new suit of clothes worth \$25 which Moakler wore were spoiled, the back having been cut out of the coat and vest. The man will be confined to his bed for a long while. Connors to-day in court pleaded not guilty to the charge of wounding the man and was allowed out on his own recognizance.

A Brutal Act.

Man Throws Kettle of Boiling Water Over His Wife.

Last evening quite an alarming scene was created in the East End of the city. The commotion was caused by an elderly resident of that section. He came home at tea hour deeply laden with alcohol and immediately started in to make matchwood of the furniture. Later he threw at his wife a kettle of boiling water, which scalded her badly about the arms and body. At this juncture screams attracted neighbors to the house. Dr. O'Connell was summoned and alleviated the woman's sufferings. In the meantime the police were acquainted and officers Kelly and Tucker were despatched to the house, but did not make an arrest as the son of the brutal greybeard did not wish to see him go to jail.

WAR NEWS.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day. War news is still comparatively uninteresting, with small engagements involving maneuvering for position. The Turkish and Balkan forces are assembling and preparing for big events. When the allied states declared war, it may be assumed Turkey had by no means concentrated her troops. Moreover, Turkey is still hoping to detach Greece from the confederation. Her failure to do this undoubtedly necessitated some change in strategic plans. She still needs time to transport her troops to required positions. Hence the falling back of small Turkish garrisons from numerous frontier posts is of no great significance. The Serbian army is steadily advancing and now has its headquarters at Vranja. The Greeks have captured Dissakata, from which position the Turks retired. A big battle is expected shortly. According to Constantinople reports, an important battle is imminent at Adrianople. Meanwhile the rival fleets are both active, the Greeks blockading the island of Lemnos and the Turks bombarding Kavarna and Varna. The reports of the sinking by the Bulgarians of a torpedo boat is discredited at Constantinople. The Greek Consul at Cardiff, acting under instructions from his Government, is laying claim to all Greek tonnage entering port. Every vessel is commandeered and becomes the property of the Greek Government. Captains and officers and Greek ship owners have requested the British Foreign Office to protest against this procedure.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day. It is admitted here that the Bulgarians are established about 12 miles from Adrianople and that a big battle is imminent. The Governor of Adrianople has issued a proclamation warning residents of the possibility of the infestation of the town. He recommends those able to leave to do so. It is announced that an important concentration of Bulgarian troops has taken place southeast of Bulgaria at Koestendil, the objective of which doubtless is Struma Valley, the easiest road to the heart of Macedonia. The Turkish Government will issue a proclamation to the people of the European provinces in reply to Ferdinand's manifesto, enjoining on Moslem's good behaviour and assuring Christians they have nothing to fear, provided they remain loyal. It is asserted that in fighting around Elasona the Greeks lost 1,500 killed.

SYDNEY, To-day. Horace J. Mayhew, interested in Broughton coal areas announced that work would begin immediately on construction of railway from Broughton to Mirabilly a distance of 3 miles. It is expected next summer a pier will be built and development of areas on a considerable scale begun.

OTTAWA, To-day. Monk's letter of resignation was handed to Prime Minister to-day. Borden will communicate it to Governor General and with the withdrawal of Minister of Public Works the incident will have been completed.

OTTAWA, To-day. With practical close of season for deep sea fishing at end of September the total value for six months from April to end of September is \$11,343,421 against total \$11,751,706 for corresponding period. The decrease is due to falling off in lobsters to the extent of 32,733 cases.

TURBOT PLENTIFUL.—Large shoals of turbot struck into Hodge Cove, T. B., Saturday, and big catches of them have been made on trawls. Jacob Smith took 102 in one haul and the fish will be landed and brought to the St. John's market.

Yesterday afternoon the Minister of Marine and Fisheries was in receipt of the accompanying message from Belleoram:—

"Four bankers arrived here, viz., Acme, with 120 qts.; Caruga, 300; Valoria, 500, and Grayling, 150. The Acme reports that one of her crew, Martin Byrne, was washed off the bowsprit and drowned on the 11th inst., off Point Amour. There is a slight improvement in the shore codfishery. Schools of herring were seen in this harbour and at other nearby places during the past few days."
