Special Evening Telegram LONDON, To-Day

War news is still comparatively un-interesting, with small engagements nvolving manoeuvering for position, the Turkish and Balkan forces as sembling and preparing for big events. When the allied states declared war, it may be assumed Turkey had by no means concentrated her roops, Moreover, Turkey is still hoping to detach Greece from the conederation. Her failure to do this undoubtedly necessitated some change in strategic plans. She still needs time to transport her troops to re-quired positions. Hence the falling back of small Turkish garrisons from numerous frontier posts is of no great significance. The Servian army is steadily advancing and now has its headquarters at Vranya. The Greeks have captured Dissikata, from which position the Turks retired. A big pattle is expected shortly. According Meanwhile the rival fleets are both active, the Greeks blockading the li land of Lemos and the Turks bombarding Kavarna and Varna. The reports of the sinking by the Bulgarians of a torpedo boat is discredited at Constantinople. The Greek Consul at Cardiff, acting under instructions from his Government, is laying claim to all Greek tonnage entering port. Every vessel is commandeer-ed and becomes the property of the Greek Government Captains and officers and Greek ship owners have requested the British Foreign Office to protest against this procedure.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-Day. It is admitted here that the Bulgarans are established about 12 miles from Adrainople and that a big battle is imminent. The Governor of Adrainople has issued a proclamation warning residents of the possibility of the infestment of the town. He ecommends those able to leave to do so. It is announced that an important concentration of Bulgarian croops has taken place southeast of Bulgaria at Koestendil, the objective of which doubtless is Struma Valley he easiest road to the heart of Macedonia. The Turkish Government will ssue a proclamation to the people of the European provinces in reply to Ferdinand's manifesto, enjoining on Moslem's good behaviour and assuring Christians they have nothing to fear, provided they remain loyal. It is asserted that in fighting around Elassona the Greeks lost 1,500 killed.

SYDNEY, To-day. Horace J. Mayhew, interested Broughton coal areas announce that work would begin immediately on construction of railway from Broughton o Mirably a distance of 3 miles. It is expected next summer a pier will be built and development of areas on a considerable scale begun.

OTTAWA, To-day. Monk's letter of resignation was handed to Prime Minister to-day. Borden will communicate it to Governor General and with the withdrawal of Minister of Public Works the incident will have been completed.

OTTAWA, To-day. With practical close of season for deep sea fishing at end of September the total value for six months from April to end of September is \$11,343,421 against total \$11,753,706 for corresponding period. The decrease is due to falling off in lobsters to the extent of 32,733 cases.
