### Household Notes.

Apples and pears should always be wiped with a clean cloth and then rinsed under the tap before using for dessert.

To keep the light of oil lamps clear, the burners should be boiled every month in water with a lump of soda in it.

Always cover newly baked bread with a clean cloth—preferably an old table cloth—to keep it free from germs and dust.

The white of an egg, whipped stiff, with a ripe banana makes a delicious cream to be eaten on a simple gelatine pudding.

Apples can be stewed with a little left-over canned fruit, such as blackberries, and the result will be a pleasant change.

Wear a sewing apron while ironing, and you will often find it possible to do a bit of mending while waiting for the iron to heat.

Sash curtains of Swiss muslin hemmed by hand are less likely to pucker when washed than when run up on the machine.

All the stripes of fat left from a steak should be left in a dish and folded out in the oven. They will make excellent fat for frying.

It pays the housekeeper to get the best bedspreads and mattresses in the market, even if she has to economize somewhere else.

Large patterns in table cloths are less economical than small ones, for the simple reason that the long threads break sooner than the short ones.

In pressing silk or satin, do not use a very hot iron nor dampen them. Lay some clean dry muslin over the seams and press with a warm iron.

A left-over dab of mashed potatoes can be made into a cupful of good soup with the addition of milk, a bit of butter and some celery salt.

A little ironing board with a cretonne case is an excellent thing for women who travel, as it can be put into the trunk with the electric iron.

Old rubberized raincoats can be put up to make cases for rubbers or slippers. Also to cover the clothes basket when laundry is sent away from home.

A cheap cut of stake can be simmered slowly in a covered frying pan, together with chopped onions and a can of tomatoes. Allow two or three hours for the cooking.

To put a gloss like new on white silk wash and rinse well, then put in water containing a teaspoonful of methylated spirit to a pint of water, and iron while damp.

When a little tomato sauce is left over, try poaching an egg in it. Season with cayenne and Worcestershire sauce. The tomatoes should be boiling when the egg is dropped.

To clean a cotton rug, lay it on the cement floor of cellar or porch, wet it, sprinkle naphtha soap powder on it and scrub with a clean broom. Then hang on the line and turn on the hose.

If you wish boiled potatoes to look pretty, peel large potatoes and cut balls out of them with the help of a potato scoop. Cook in boiling salted water for ten minutes, drain and pour over them a little melted butter, then roll in minced parsley and sprinkle with salt and pepper.

### Tribute To Glasgow.

Glasgow, Scotland, according to a writer in The National Magazine, is the "most progressively governed city in the United Kingdom." The city, the writer further states, owns all its public services, makes them render efficient service to the people at low rates and makes them yield each a yearly profit, part of which goes to take up bonded debt and part into a common good fund, out of which the city is gradually substituting comfortable, healthful, municipally owned tenements for the villainous and disease-breeding slum tenements which grew up in Glasgow, as they have done in most other large cities, under the pressure of the demand for private profit.

Glasgow supplies its citizens with cheaper gas and electric light, cheaper street car service and better than are enjoyed by the residents of any American city. Glasgow's municipal slaughterhouse, in which all animals intended for food for Glasgow's 1,000,000 people are killed and dressed for market, is a huge institution, set right in the heart of the city, yet so clean that one could pass within a hundred yards of it and never suspect its existence by reason of any odor in the air.

The municipal abattoir and market insure the healthfulness of all meats eaten in Glasgow, and help mightily to hold down prices by eliminating a lot of middlemen who take tolls on this business in other cities.

## Youngest Lord Mayor.

Mr. Arthur Samuel, Lord Mayor of Norwich (Eng.), enjoys the distinction of being the youngest Lord Mayor ever elected in Britain. He is only 39 years of age, and until his marriage the other day Norwich was without a Lady Mayoress.

Mr. Samuel is a Jew, and the first of his race to occupy such a position in Norwich. His family, however, have been connected with Norfolk and Suffolk for several centuries, and he himself is very popular in his native shire. Mr. Samuel has political as well as civic ambitions, and is the Unionist candidate for the Stratford Division of Lancashire. Despite the similarity of name, he is not related to the Samuels who already sit in the British Commons.

His wedding at the West London Synagogue was marked by several characteristic features. It was semi-private and ancient Hebrew melodies were sung. There were no bridesmaids, and in accordance with the express wish of the bridegroom no gifts were offered. The only two he has received came from the magistrates and citizens of Norwich, and his political supporters in Manchester.


### Died on 11th Birthday.
