TURKISH WAR REPORT.

CONSTANTINOPLE via London, To-day The Turkish War Office gove out the following to-night: "On the Dardanelles front there have been heavy battles with bomb throwing on both wings and a temporary artillery fire along the whole line. A hostile cruiser and a monotor retreated after temporary bombardment of our positions. Our airmen flew over hostile position and made a successful reconnaisance: Near Ariburnu four hundred cases of munitions which were concealed by the enemy were found there.
