Regiment. He read the telegram from the Premier which we printed yesterday, and stated that Acting Lt. Colonel Forbes-Robertson had won the esteem and confidence of the Regiment, of which he is temporarily in command. The strength of the 1st Battalion, in France, on March 1st was 1125, without any reserves; that of the 2nd Battalion, at Ayr, is now about 540 fit men. His Excellency went on to state that silver badges to be worn by soldiers who had been discharged for disabilities, whether of wounds or sickness, contracted through military service, had arrived. The terms of issue and wearing are compiled from the King's Regulations, and will be published in due course. Arrangements are being made to have the badges distributed with all speed. After reading a summary of the casualties incurred since the last report, the Governor referred to a communication received from the British Secretary of State to the effect that arrangements were being made for the burying of all Overseas soldiers, who die in the United Kingdom, in separate graves, which will be carefully and worthily tended. With reference to the Memorial Cards, the Governor stated that a covering and appreciative note will be sent with each. He referred briefly to the despatches from the official Eye Witness at the front, and spoke in detail of the manuscript history of the Newfoundland Regiment, which had been compiled by Mr. H. F. Reeves to date and would be published seriatim in the local press. For much of the


