late T. A. Winsor, Esq., will read with
profound regret the report of his
death. The grim visitor having claim-
ed him yesterday morning, at the Gen-
eral Hospital. By his death we lose
one of our most respected citizens.
His death, although not unexpected
by those who followed him in his last
months of suffering, will be felt by his
many friends not only in the city but
in some of the outposts as well. For
to know him was to respect him. De-
ceased, after completing his studies at
Bishop Field College, entered the
teaching profession and did good and
notable work for several years. He
then entered the office of the N. S. S.
& C. Co., at Bell Island and served
that firm as accountant. He resumed
his teaching duties, however, in 1914
and was placed in charge of Clark's
Head School, Gander Bay, by the C.
of E. Board of Education. It was
there that the writer met him and
had the pleasure of his company all
through the long winter months. His
work at Gander Bay was indeed a
success. One has only to view the beau-
tiful seats in the school there and
other work of his undertaking and
also to notice his hard and strenuous
work in connection with the religious
and patriotic affairs of the place
which speak of his untiring endeav-
ours to feel proud of him and sorry
for his passing. A truly promising
life cut off in its prime of manhood.
His was a life well worth copying
and by his death our country loses
one of her most worthy and trusted
sons. May his soul rest in peace.
