LONDON, To-Day, An official report from British headquarters in France at midnight gress, in the course of which we have been made by us during the day south of the Souchez River. Our line in this area has again been advanced on a front of nearly two miles. Our troops have reached the outskirts of Avion. Activity in the air continued yesterdown in an air fight and two others were driven down out of control. In addition two hostile machines were shot down and two others were driven down by fire from the ground. Four of our airplanes are missing."

Mrs. J. Pearcey, 17 Boncloddy St. has received two post cards and a letter from her son, Pte. W. L. Pearcey, No. 3016, of the Newfoundland Regiment. He was amongst those captured by the Germans in the April drive and is now a wounded prisoner of war in Darmstadt, Germany.

He states he is getting along fairly well and is in a good place and receiving attention. He adds he has a lot to be thankful for and believes he will be all right again soon as he was not wounded badly. "I have a lot of friends here," he states, "including | some of our own boys." But he does not mention any of the names of the latter. He writes also that he will be glad to receive parcels of food and other necessaries. The weather there at time of writing was nice and sunny and is helping to soothe his wound, which is in the right arm.
