

RECONCILIATORY BUT FIRM.

Britain Does Not Recede From Her Position -- Hopeful of Amicable Settlement--Belgium Sends Troops to Help French -- Naval Flotilla to Patrol the Rhine -- Scotland Wants Complete Local Control -- Fourth Public Session of League of Nations.

AMICABLE ARRANGEMENT CERTAIN.

London, April 11. Dispatches from Paris to-day are optimistic regarding hopes for an amicable settlement of the Anglo-French difficulty over the occupation of French troops of German towns. According to a statement from an authoritative quarter to-night the situation still bears grave aspects, first because there seems to be no intention on the part of the British Government to recede from its firm demand against any important action which the Alliance is concerned, and secondly because no sign is yet apparent that France is willing to withdraw her troops, but rather there is a disposition to extend her occupation.

THE ANGLO-FRENCH DIFFICULTY.

PARIS, April 11. The Earl of Derby, British Ambassador to France, this morning handed to Premier Millerand, Great Britain's reply to the last French note concerning France's invasion of the Rhineland. The note is animated with a spirit of conciliation according to the semi-official communication, and allows of the hope that within a brief time the difficulties which have arisen in the past few days will be smoothed over, and that the representative of Great Britain will return to the Ambassador's conference. Premier Millerand this evening transmitted to the Earl of Derby France's reply to the British note delivered to-day. The British note will not be made public by the French Government, but it is believed that it attaches special importance to the interpretation of the sentence of France's note made Saturday, the British Government assuming that France is reserving liberty of action in all connections with approval or consultations with other Allies, and also that it contemplates that France was duly informed before occupation of the Rhineland. The text of the last French note on which Great Britain requests an interpretation is as follows: "Preceding considerations stated, the French Government hesitate to declare that in all the questions arising from the execution of the Treaty, it foresees in which it should not be glad to act in concert with its Allies." Concerning the second point raised in the British note, the French say that diplomatic documents will finally elucidate the matter. The diplomatic commentator of the Paris Press sums up the situation as follows: "Premier Lloyd George asks France to bind herself not to act in future

without obtaining in advance the approval of the Allies. Millerand replies that France is disposed to make sure beforehand of the assent of her Allies. On one side it is desired that France renounce all liberty of action."

BELGIUM BACKS FRANCE.

ARION, Belgian Luxembourg, April 10. A battalion of Belgian troops, five hundred strong, with bands playing and flags flying, left here to-day by way of Coblenz for Mayence. The troops will arrive at their destination on Monday evening, and be officially received by the French army, and then will proceed to the occupied cities.

FRENCH GUNBOATS FOR THE RHINE.

PARIS, April 11. The Petit Parisien says it learns that four small gunboats armed with machine guns, have left Cherbourg for the Rhine, where they will supervise the river.

JAPS CAPTURE IMPORTANT RAILWAY.

HONOLULU, April 11. The Japanese have captured the entire Usuri railroad between Vladivostok and Habarovsk, according to a cable despatch received from Tokyo by the Shimpo. The Usuri railroad from Vladivostok to Habarovsk is about four hundred miles in length.

GEDDES LEAVES FOR WASHINGTON.

LIVERPOOL, April 11. Sir Auckland Geddes sailed yesterday afternoon for the United States to take up his post as British Ambassador. In a message to the press he told of his appreciation of the manner in which the British press had helped him since his appointment.

SCOTLAND WANTS HOME RULE.

GLASGOW, April 11. Under the auspices of the Scottish Home Rule Association, a meeting was held yesterday, at which a resolution was adopted asking the Government to pass a bill giving Scotland control of purely Scottish affairs. The meeting was non-partisan and speeches were made by Alexander MacCallum Scott and Neil MacLean, members of the House of Commons for Glasgow.

FRENCH EXTEND THEIR LINE.

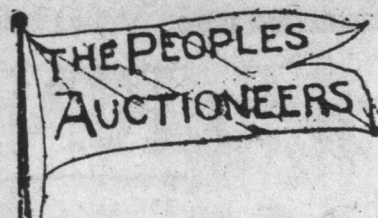
LONDON, April 10. The French forces are extending their zone of occupation in the Mainz region, according to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. from Berlin, quoting the Lokal Anzeiger. Stockholm, in Bavaria, and Bevenhausen have already been occupied, and it is understood French troops are marching toward Aschaffenburg from Darmstadt.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS MEETS.

PARIS, April 11. The fourth public sitting of the Council of the League of Nations took place this afternoon in the Luxembourg Palace, Leon Bourgeois, President of the French Association of the Society of Nations, presiding. Herbert A. L. Fisher, British Minister of Education, representing Great Britain, read a report on the Armenian situation, advocating the constitution of a state of Armenia on a free and independent basis. The best means for reaching such a solution, the report said, was the acceptance for Armenia by some state under the League of Nations. Baron De Galigny D'Hestroy, Belgian Minister, read a report on minorities in Turkey affecting the fate of two million non-Muslims. The Council agreed to accept the request of Earl Curzon of Kedleston, British Foreign Secretary asking the Council to consent to a guarantee clause in the Turkish Treaty of Peace now under preparation concerning the protection on minorities. As the guarantee clauses have not yet been settled, however, it is announced that the Council had found it impossible to evolve a practical solution until the Treaty is finished.

A GALLANT AIRMAN.

TORONTO, April 11. Lieut.-Col. Wm. Barker, V.C., D.S.O., has been awarded a second silver medal by the King of Italy for his wonderful and heroic fighting in October, 1918, in which he tackled sixty Hun single handed and shot down six of them before he was brought down by enemy fire. The award reads, "Protector of Air." Col. Barker now holds
