### Nfld. Motor Association.

HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING.  
ROAD IMPROVEMENTS WILL BE  
CONTINUED.

The annual meeting of the Newfoundland Motor Association was held at the West End Restaurant yesterday at 6.15 p.m. The attendance, which was fairly large, sat down to an excellent supper served by Mr. Stirling, and his assistants; and after the many good things had been done full justice to, the meeting followed. Mr. Angus Reid, the President, occupied the chair, while Mr. H. E. Cowan, in the absence of the Secy.-Treasurer, read the report of the past year's work, which was adopted unanimously.

An interesting report of the work done by the Road Commission during the past year was presented by Mr. T. Soper. In the first place the Commission started operations with a deficit of \$7,500. This balance, together with the amount expended during the season, totalled about \$22,000 against which \$18,000 was credited, leaving a deficit to begin this season's work of about \$4,000. Considerable work was done to the roads at St. John's, Torbay, Pouch Cove, Carbonear to Brigus, Portugal Cove, Winsor Lake section, Bay Bulls, Topsail and Seal Cove. Work on the Seal Cove line, which was undertaken late last Fall, cost in the vicinity of \$6,000. This work is now being continued and the road will be widened to a minimum of 12 feet. The Road Commission has now under discussion the following programme for the season:

To continue building of Seal Cove Line .....	\$6,000
To repair and rebuild Torbay Road, particularly Piper's Stock Hill .....	1,500
To widen and repair Portugal Cove Road .....	2,000
To widen, repair and properly ditch Bay Bulls Road .....	2,000
To expend from Carbonear to Brigus .....	2,500
To remove boulders, corners and repair from Holyrood to Brigus .....	1,000
To continue repairs and improvements to Topsail Road particularly to Topsail Hill .....	2,000
This makes an expenditure of \$17,000 out of a budget of \$18,000.	

Mr. Arch Munn, upon moving the adoption of the Road Commission's report, expressed his appreciation on behalf of the Association, for the splendid manner in which this work had been so well conducted and successfully carried out.

Hon. W. J. Ellis, upon seconding the motion, corroborated all that Mr. Munn had said and joined heartily in extending his congratulations to all concerned in the work. He regretted this road building movement had not been started fifty years ago as during the short time the Commission had undertaken to carry out this work he felt sure that motorists and the public in general appreciated their efforts. California, which boasts of having the best roads in the world, has no frost, and once the roads are made they remain forever. A road from San Diego to San Francisco, a distance of over 500 miles, is now under construction. The building of the road will cost in the vicinity of \$20,000 per mile.

President Reid thanked Hon. Mr. Ellis for his very instructive and interesting address.

Mr. E. Collishaw felt that the work on the Cowpath should be abandoned for this season. The amount of expenditure of \$6,000 would be better invested in the purchase of a roller and perhaps an extra tractor, or spent on the roads nearer the city. With the addition of the roller a saving of fifty or seventy-five per cent. would result on the roads already made, as it would prevent the gravel from blowing away with high winds. He supported the other expenditures as proposed for the season.

The matter of purchasing a new roller will be discussed at a general meeting of the Association which takes place on Thursday next.

President Watson, in a very happy speech thanked the Association for the honor bestowed upon him, and hoped, with the assistance of the new executive, to make the season of 1923, a successful one. Before the meeting concluded, the new President proposed a vote of thanks to the retiring officers, which was duly accorded by acclamation.

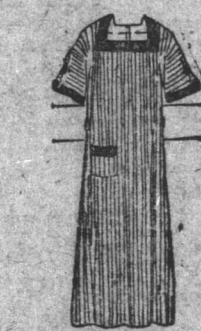

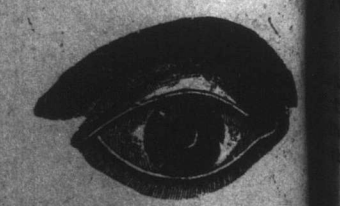
