Dr. Draper's Address to Rotarian

Your Excellency and Gentlemen .- I am delighted to be here amongst old friends again. I cannot tell you, when the old "Rosalind" came into port, how delighted I was to see the place again, and to know what was waiting here, for I never can forget your hor pitality to me here four years ago,

and to Mrs. Draper and the children. After this very flattering introduction. I must say that I approach this subject with very great diffidence. My gifted friend, Dr. Mitchell, is a more accomplished speaker than I and he can also tell a great many fairy stories. These are, what he has told you to-day about my virtues. However, we have done a great deal of work, and I thought, so long as the Captain was so gracious as to get us in in time, I would say something to you about this cure of insanity. Your Governor Sir William Allardyce was so gracious as to ask me to come and I hope my visit will really result doing something for you.

There are several different aspects this work. Of course the first that will attract the men of the Rotary of it. After all that is the real thing. in addition to that there is the side which appeals to everybody, to all the taxpayers, and will also, I am sure, be one of the means through which you can appeal to your Legis-

lative body; that is the financial side Now, I am just going to take a few moments, but I want to tell you something about the enormous size of the problem. It is really tremendous. Unfortunately, I understand that statistics are lacking in this Dominion as regards the increase of insanity. Now, of course, it will be impossible for me to give more than just a very sketchy outline of the subject, but I will go into it in more detail with the profession of the city to-morrow

night, and from them you will be able to get any information that I may not e able to give you now. Since 1880-we had statistics drawn ap about four years ago of the inrease of insanity in the United States

-and between 1880 and 1920 the increase in people confined was four nundred and sixty-eight per cent., while the increase in the population was only one hundred and twelve per cent. You see that is slightly over four fold, which is a perfectly staggering thing to contemplate. That increase has taken place under a form of treatment known as psychoanalysis, that was a metaphysical method of treating the sick, which has, perhaps, many advantages, to greater benefit perhaps to the pro-

the profession at any rate. It has been ession than to the sick. Certainly, from the standpoint of any intelligent business, it would not be good to continue with a method of treatment, that has allowed of a four fold increase within the last forty years. Insanity used to seem to me to be a

very dreadful thing. It was a sort of a niystery. We were brought up as Ox Blood 2 in 1 Shoe Bla students to look upon it as a thing apart. It is all part of general medisine, and the insane are entitled to Very Best Canadian Butter. have the same care and attention that any other sick person has. It you Hartley's Rasp. and Straw. give that sort of attention, it costs a little more in the beginning. For instance, in the State of New Jersey, where the administration of the Health Department is probably better than in any other state in the United States, we spend fifteen dollars per capita on the care of the insane, whereas in the entire state of New York, which adjoins us, they spend only two dollars per capita. I am mortified to say that I am a citizen of New York. This has all come about through the activities of a very modern and up-to-date Department of Large Green Grapes 19c. lb. Health. The head of it is a specially trained business man. He is not a doctor, but he is a highly trained hygienist. He believes in publicity and spares no effort, and if any of you people finally decide to form some sort of a committee to study the whole problem, you will find that the whole thing is available for the pub-

lic use. As a result of six years' work in Trenton, my colleague and I are esmated, on very conservative grounds, to have saved the State of New Jersey in this one relatively small hospital, around one million dollars. According to that, and figuring that conditions here are the same, and they certainly are not better on account of climatic conditions, you should be able to save fifty thousand dollars a year.
