EDMONTON MAY EMPLOY A CALGARY STANDS FOURTH I

Protection of Wayward Girls Compilation of Western Indus-Demands Use of Female Police Officer

Planned to Have "Bobbyess" Wear Uniform and Patrol Regular Beat

Edmonton, Sept. 14.—In the near future, if matters go as they bid fair at tle present time, Edmonton will be for ther ornamented by a constabulary, not of burly males, but graceful fe-males, daintly garbed in sea blue unimales, daintily garbed in sea blue uni-forms, brass buttons, and of courses as shown by the figures collected in hat to match. Whether they will carry patons or mot has not been decided, but it was intimated that if they were veritable daughters of Venus they would require nothing more than a serene winning smile.

This new departure in the Canadian West came before the city commissioners yesterday in the form of a com-munication from R. B. Chadwick, who asked that a woman officer be appointed to serve under the Caldren's Protection Act, and be empowered the same as a constable to enter any house wherein suspicion lurks that girls might be. Vancouver has a woman officer, and Ottawa has two women acting as policemen, and according to reports they are doing excellent work among the girls of the city.

Woman Officer Needed "For some time past there has bee a decided need of a woman officer in the city," says Mr. Chadwick, "to dea more particularly with young giris under the age of 18 years who come under the meaning of the Children's Protection Act. During the past year some 185 girls have been dealt with through the medium of the department of neglected and delinquent children."

Every time the juventle court sits there are a number of girls before the stipendiary who are leading doubtful lives, and when these girls in the infancy of their life of vice are looked after by a proper person, one emin to undertake looking after them and keeping them within the meaning the act, their moral welfare will be greatly benefited.

Should Have Training Mr. Chadwick continued:

"A woman such as would be required should have considerable training and be able to deal with the particular problem which the city girl presents. The services of such a person could be secured for \$75 per month, and she could look after a number of girls with whom the department is unable to keep in touch and look efter them." The commissioners decided to ask Mr. Chadwick to name a suitable person, and the matter would be referred to council for consideration.


