

EDMONTON MAY EMPLOY A "GOPPES"

Protection of Wayward Girls Demands Use of Female Police Officer

Planned to Have "Bobbyess" Wear Uniform and Patrol Regular Beat

Edmonton, Sept. 14.—In the near future, if necessary, so as they bid fair at the present time, Edmonton will be further ornamented by a constabulary, not of burly males, but graceful females, dressed in sea blue uniforms, brass buttons, and of course a hat to match. Whether they will carry batons or not has not been decided, but it was intimated that if they were to be constabulary, they would require nothing more than a serene winning smile.

This new departure in the Canadian West came before the city commission yesterday in the form of a communication from R. B. Chadwick, who stated that a woman officer be appointed to serve under the Children's Protection Act, and be employed in the same as a constable to enter any house where a suspicion lurks that girls might be. Vancouver has a woman officer, and Ottawa has two women acting as policemen, and according to reports they are doing excellent work among the girls.

Woman Officer Needed

"For some time past there has been a decided need of a woman officer in the city," says Mr. Chadwick, "to deal more particularly with young girls under the age of 18 years who come under the meaning of the Children's Protection Act. During the past year some 115 girls have been dealt with through the medium of the department of neglected and delinquent children. Every time the juvenile court sits there are a number of girls before the stipendiary who are leading doubtful lives, and when these girls in the infancy of their life have been looked after by a proper person, one eminent to undertake looking after them and keeping them within the meaning of the act, their moral welfare will be greatly benefited.

Should Have Training

Mr. Chadwick continued: "A woman such as would be required should have considerable training, and be able to deal with the particular problem which the city girl presents. The services of such a person could be secured for \$75 per month, and she could look after a number of girls with whom the department is unable to keep in touch and look after them."

The commissioners decided to ask Mr. Chadwick to name a suitable person, and the matter would be referred to council for consideration.

WAR IN BALKANS IS NOW ALMOST CERTAIN

Freedom of Macedonia Must be Forced From Turkey, Says Progressive Party

London, Sept. 14.—Prophecy of a war in the Balkans receives their expression today. The Progressive Party of the Daily Mail attaches the greatest importance to a declaration of the two great powers, from which the present Balkan government was drawn. The declaration says, among other things: "We have no objection to the freedom of Macedonia, provided that the other great powers must compel them to do so, or allow us to do the compulsion."

To Free Macedonia

After outlining what form of government they think necessary, the leaders say: "If this cannot be secured it must be won by force. It would not be war, but a crusade."

Other accounts represent Serbia and Greece as being ready to support Bulgaria. The pacific societies of those countries are holding meetings, and are urging the powers to secure the freedom of Macedonia.

HUSBAND IS JEALOUS OF CHIMPANZEE

Philadelphia, Sept. 14.—James Norris, trainer of an amusement enterprise at Sixteenth and Market streets, this afternoon killed one of the performing chimpanzees with a crowbar and was arrested on a charge of cruelty to animals.

Leo Noges, employer of Norris, who appeared before Magistrate Harris when the warrant was sworn out, said Norris was angered at the big chimpanzee, which was the most intelligent of the collection, because Mrs. Norris appeared to be very fond of the animal, which was very unbecoming when she was around. She always fed the chimpanzee.

Just before the performance today, Noges said, Norris entered the cage. He was armed with a crowbar. Singling out the chimpanzee, he struck the animal on the head and fractured its skull. It died in a few moments.

Noges declared that the chimpanzee was the cause of numerous arguments between Mr. and Mrs. Norris, the husband objecting to Mrs. Norris petting the animal.

CALGARY STANDS FOURTH IN MANUFACTORIES

Compilation of Western Industries Shows City Leads All in Alberta

Winnipeg First, Vancouver Is Second, Victoria But Eight in Lead of This City

Ottawa, Sept. 14.—That there are a large number of manufacturing establishments in Western Canada, is made evident by figures given out at the census department today showing the number of establishments in existence, the capital employed and the output as shown by the figures collected in connection with the taking of recent censuses. The figures are tabulated for seven western industrial centres are as follows:

NUN HONORS BIRTHDAY OF MANSFIELD

Washington, Sept. 15.—Behind a simple memorial, which made its appearance in a local newspaper on the 30th of August, lies the shadow of the great love, given up by a woman in order that her sweetheart might become great in the eyes of the world. The memorial, which appears on this date every year, reads: August 30, 1907, Richard Mansfield.

"We pass the path that each man trod. Is dim, or will be dim, with weeds; What fame is left for human deeds save endless age? It rests with God. Through the mail to this newspaper it comes each year on the anniversary of the great actor's death. It is written in a convent, where even the name of the sender is hidden under the name bestowed by the church. When Richard Mansfield was in his first great New York success he met and loved a young Maryland girl, by whom he was loved in return. Her parents forbade the marriage, then relented on condition that Mansfield leave the stage and become a Catholic. The actor felt the future before him; the girl who loved him saw his coming greatness and she gave him up, went abroad and on her return entered a convent in Washington. When Mansfield first saw her she wore white roses in her hair and from time to time he sent to the convent a number of white roses until the black-robed sister became known to the nuns as the "Sister of the Rose."

Butte, Mont., Sept. 15.—Like an echo of the pioneer days was an incident that took place in a Broadway saloon yesterday. A man, whose face showed the constant exposure of weather and who was dressed in overalls and a heavy flannel shirt, open at the neck, giving a glimpse of a red flannel undershirt, stood at the bar talking to a friend. Pulling a chamois bag from his pocket, he dumped the contents on the bar. A cluster of yellow nuggets rattled on the polished surface, while a stream of gold dust followed the ceasing jangle.

The man was Robert Smith, a pioneer prospector of the state, who had just come to Butte from near the Highlands south of the city, where he owns a placer claim. The gold represented his last cleanup and amounted to about \$600. He was showing a friend the nuggets and dust, and after carefully scooping the gold back into the chamois sack, he walked to a local bank and sold the yellow metal.
