AVIMER, FEBRUARY 4, 1895. Editor Express, Aylmer, Ont.

DEAR SIR,-I am told that there are rumors of the existence of smallpox in the Town of Aylmer. This is utterly untrue. Up to this morning there have been no cases of smallpox in Aylmer, and I hope we shall have none. There are no cases nearer than Copenhagen, seven miles from here.

Will you kindly insert this in your paper, and oblige, Yours truly, JNO. CRAWFORD,

The position is much the same at Copenhagen, as reported on Saturday. Mrs. Austin Jay and child are practically well, so much so in fact, that they are, or have been over at her daughters, Mrs. Silas Ashton. The disease in the case of Mrs. Ashton and child and Mrs. Percy is taking its usual course. The report that Mr. Jos. Saunders is down with it is probably correct He had the symptoms of the smallpox a few days ago, and is now broken out with a days ago, and is now broken out with a rash. Mrs. R. H. Lindsay, who was reported as down with it, was all right on Sunday. So far as we can learn this morning, there are no new cases beyond this

Every possible precaution is being taken to confine the disease. Dr. Bryce, the Provincial Medical Health Officer, has been notified, and is expected here at once, and will no doubt oversee the whole matter. The infected district will be strictly quaranined, and, with the cases all known, there is no danger whatever of its spreading. The Boards of Health of both Aylmer and Malahide are fully alive to the case. As we said before, there is no case in or near Aylmer, and should there be one at any time in the future, all preparations are already made for an immediate and strict quarantine, which will amply protect both our own citizens and all others who may visit the town.
