Matters in connection with the building of the Aylmer, London and North Shore Electric Road have been making wonderful advances during the past few weeks and it is now a certainty that the road will be built during the summer of 1908. The company have secured the services of Mr. W. Warnock as trustee, and he will have absolute control of all the money received from the sale of the bonds, \$1,000,000 worth of which are now in his posession, and it will be his duty to see that every dollar of this money is used in the construction and equipment of the road. There will be no watered stock and no promotors' shares given away, but the whole scheme will be carried out on sound business principles and the fact of Mr. Warnock being trustee for the funds makes this a certainty beyond the shadow of a doubt. If electric roads of this kind can be made to pay, as they have in every instance, even where the stock is largely watered, this road must pay its shareholders big dividends. The interest is guaranteed for the first two years, and no electric road on this continent runs for 42 miles through such good farming country. The fact that Mr. Warnock having been practically put in control of the funds of the Co. will give the people of this section, who know him, more confidence in the scheme than any other one thing that could be done and he will have no trouble in disposing of seventy-five or one hundred thousand dollars worth of these bonds to parties living in this section of the country, as no bonus or other special favors are being asked. The Co. have secured the services of Mr. E. W. Davis as accountant and financial secretary, who will have a desk in Mr. Warnock's office. which will be the head office of the Co. until the road is completed. He will move to town at once and commence his duties.
