ROWDYISM.

As to rowdiness, about every magazine in the National League has declared itself upon the necessity of reform. Ned Hanlon is the latest manager to express his opinion, which is especially interesting, in view of the fact that the Orioles were so generally regarded as one of the worst teams on the field in this particular during the past season. President Brush of Cincinnati, says: "Baseball cannot stand any more of the disgraceful scenes that have brought the game into disrepute in the last season or so, and at the next league meeting this matter will come up for the most severe discussion it ever has had. This year has shown us that only by the most severe measures can this disgraceful conduct on the part of some players be suppressed. Why, during the season language has been used on the field by certain players that should have been forever from playing another game in any team that is under the national agreement. And I, for one, am heartily in favor of any league that will punish players who disgrace the game."

After Constable Ward.

London West Council Refute His Account Until He Explains It.

Councillor Hamilton's Remarks Regarding Mr. Ward—Borrowed Money—The Solicitors' Account.

The days of the London West Council are fast drawing to a close, and after two more meetings—the regular one on the first Tuesday in December, and the statutory meeting on Dec. 15, that august body will cease to exist. The council held the regular meeting last night and passed two bylaws. One was to authorize the borrowing of \$600 to tide them over until the taxes come in, and the other was a bylaw legalizing the sale of a parcel of property to Mr. Wm. Cotton.

The village solicitors in a communication inclosed an account for \$224.43, which covered everything to date except the mandamus proceedings of Barran against Rockett, as to which Mr. Barran has given notice of application to the court of appeal for next week, to appeal against the judgment of the divisional court without giving securities for costs. The solicitors also charged in connection with the Horman arbitration, but stating that the arbitration charges are all finally paid by the street railway company. The letter also stated that the charges in connection with the street railway bylaw should be referred by the company, and possibly some arrangement might be made regarding the same. This matter was laid over for further consideration.

Mr. Wm. Wilson applied for some boards for a sidewalk on Carolina street—a short street running diagonally from the street railway to the street.

He had asked for them repeatedly, and Councillor Hamilton had promised them as much as he could give.

Deputy Reeve Collins—Is that the way you do, Mr. Hamilton—promise people things that they don't get? Mr. Hamilton said he had promised them as much as he could give.

Mr. Wilson said taxes had been paid for the property on that street for about 40 years, and the residents couldn't get so much as a load of gravel.

Councillor Hamilton promised to attend to it, and on motion the matter was left in his hands.

Among the business was one from Constable Ward for \$25.00, two months' salary.

Councillor Hamilton wanted to know why Constable Ward was not present to explain some matters. The sidewalk in some parts were in a disgraceful condition, having been torn up and torn up, yet no reports had been made. "A woman fell on the sidewalk the other day and injured herself," said the cost of this village," said Mr. Hamilton, "and Ward was only a short distance away, and no report was made, what was he doing? The world we have been paying that fellow for. It is a piece of robbery, if he is going to work for Lacey & Co. I want him to be paid by them. The boys were raising Cain over here, and there was no one around to keep them quiet. He was sent for, but there was no one around."

Reeve Saunby said Ward was away looking for glass.

Councillor Hamilton thought it was not his place to go out and fix sidewalks, nor to find out who pulled them up and broke them. While Ward was away looking after other people's business, the village had to pay an other constable for services to keep the boys from doing damage on Hal lowe'en. This he thought a disgrace to the village.

Reeve Saunby—I must say he has been very slack in his duty the past three months.

It was decided to lay the account over until next meeting, when Mr. Ward will be asked to attend and explain.

A motion passed requesting the treasurer to provide a statement showing all the expenditures to the different accounts for the past year.

The report of the treasurer was received, showing a balance on hand on Oct. 30 of \$2,156.21, and receipts to have been \$149 from taxes and \$25 from W. Cotton, making \$2,325.21. The expenditure had been \$2,214.71, leaving a balance of \$1,110.50 on hand.

Deputy Reeve Collins and Mr. Hamilton wanted to know when the street railway company were going to gravel their portion of the street they occupy.

The reeve explained that a "Y" would shortly be put in at William street, when the company would put a gang of men on and have the road in proper shape. "At least they promised to do so," he said.

Laymen in Convention.

A Strong Presentation of Their Duty in Promoting Christianity.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

The public have been treated to a report of the meeting of the lay workers in Huron diocese. Their society has been in existence seven years, and I judge the "Lord's army" is a great thing for them. I am glad of it, and what I want to know is, what are they doing for the Lord? Having freely received, they should freely give. The evening service of the first day was conducted by one clergyman and three laymen, the latter reading the lessons and the Psalms. All very good as far as it goes. But is that the kind of help the church needs, and is it of primary importance? There were many clergymen present at the service, so it would not appear there was any special "needs" for laymen. The fact that the church prescribes that the malleable heritage of the priesthood or ministry, when the ministry could do a similar thing, is a thing when "he put forth his hand to the ark of God, and took hold of it," he would not well proceed. The clergy need help, and Professors need well, "that every man worked better for a warm support." But what is the practical use of the clergy from lay workers? Inspiration puts it in this way, "If we have sown unto spiritual things, is it a great thing if we shall reap your carnal things?" How do these lay workers stand in this respect? It is very strange that the "bishop announced that this week the widow of a clergyman, lately deceased, had heard that owing to the deficiency in the mission fund, the clergy had their salaries reduced," and as practical evidence of her sympathy she had sent \$2,000 in cash to assist them. When reading it, I thought the commendation given by our Lord to another widow might be given to her. "Of a truth, I say unto you, she hath cast in more than they all." She came to the help of the poorest paid clergy in the diocese, and she was a widow of observation. It is passing strange that she came to the help of the priesthood of God at the very time these lay workers were in convention. Was it the hand of God pointing out to them their duty? If they had done their duty, they would not have been in the mission fund, in spite of the assurances in the affirmative recently made by Assistant Superintendent Atwater. Ground Broken for a New G. T. R. Roundhouse at Sarnia.

Movement in Freight Very Active on the Canadian Ron. — O condition of the M. C. R.

It is reported that three crews will be removed from the G. T. R. roundhouse at Stratford to Sarnia. The G. T. R. have broken ground for the new roundhouse at the Sarnia tunnel. The new structure will contain 25 stalls.

Brakeman A. Betcone, of Walkerville, will run on the Port Stanley division in the place of A. Devitt, who has been transferred to Walkerville. Operations on the new G. T. R. station at Berlin are well advanced, and if the weather continues favorable, it will be ready for occupation by Christmas.

The movement of freight is very active on the Canadian Pacific, notwithstanding the crippling of a few engines. Monday was a record breaker, no less than 267 cars of freight going through Toronto from the west, via the main line through London, and 101 cars via Hamilton.

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
