visiting Coulterville, in Mariposa county, California, recently interview J. A. Patrick, an old-time resident of London, Canada. Mr. Patrick has had a varied experience of California life, and is now located in the center of the principal gold mining district in the southern end of what is known as the great Mother Lode of California. As consequence, he is often written to by old friends in this State, who think they could improve matters by going to California. The interviewer found Mr. Patrick in a communicative mood, and invited him to state his impressions of California, as compared with Canada. "Well," said Mr. Patrick, "I am always getting letters from old friends in Canada, where I spent some of the best years of my life. It takes me all my time to attend to my busiscratch out a answering long letters, and I am not fond of writing much, anyway. Of course, there is room at the top anywhere, but I don't hesitate to advise anyone who can make out in Canada. to stay where he is instead of coming to California, unless he can secure a position before he starts. Everything is overdone, and there are thousands of idle men about. A man finds it hard to make good friends here. The people are mostly a wandering lot, here today and away tomorrow, and a man is best to stay where he has friends. As regards work, most of it is in the employment of the big companies, and unless a man can get a pull on some of the bosses he stands a poor show. In the gold mines round about here nobody but a thoroughly skilled miner stands a chance of work, and the principal company in this district employs none but Cornish miners. ing it all round," said Pat, as Mr. Patrick is familiarly called by his many friends, "there is a great deal too much blowing and gassing done by the newspapers about this great and glorious California, as they name it, and while I am not making any particular kick against the place. I advise any man who has a comfortable home to stay where he is. People live pretty hard out here. The general style of living is about as rough as is usual in railroad camps. It is no sort of a place to rear a family in, unless for rich people in San Francisco and the big towns, who can afford to make it what they like. An ordinary man with a family has few of the comforts that he can get in Canada, even if he is making good wages. All gold mining is in the hands of capitalists. placer gold workings are played out, even for Chinamen and the few white men that are still prospecting for gold scarcely make grub at it. There is many a man out here now that rues the day when he left a good home in Canada, and would now be on the road back again if he could find any way to get there without walking. Many of the best native born Californians are now making their way east to look for chances in life that they fail to find here. Of course, if a man sends his friends a California newspaper it will only just mislead him. They will find it full of blow about sunshine, fruit and flowers, and festivals, but they will not read of the thousands of hungry men roaming around looking for a job of any kind, and unable to get work.
