Grain was cheaper in Canada than it was in the United States, and Walker made money rapidly. Some years ago he was offered \$7,000,000 for his distillery by a London syndicate, but refused the offer.

Distillery slop was valuable for cattle, and Mr. Walker took up the business of fattening cattle for the Liver-pool market. He established a big farm within two miles of his dis-tillery, and pumped his fattening slops there through a big brass tube. In 1894, 24,000 cattle were shipped to the London market.
