All of them narrowly escaped death, and all of them suffered intensely from the cold. In getting from the building all were more or less injured. The three upper floors were gutted. Loss, \$10,000.

Mayor Little Inspects the Police Force. At the police station yesterday afternoon there were gathered about 35 of the best specimens of stalwart manhood that could be found in more than a day's march. They were the members of the London police force, and had assembled to be ins spected by Mayor J. W. Little. Jenkins, Mayor Little made a personal inspection of the tunics, overcoats, helmets, caps, belts and other portions of their outfits and expressed satisfaction with the appearance of the men. Mayor Little then made a short address giving his ideal of a mode! policeman. He urged the officers to use the greatest degree of civility to every person-and especially to those in distress. The poorest person met with should be as well treated as one of high social standing. Mayor Little said he had never heard any complaints against the police force, and he was always proud of the men who guarded the interests of the city. He urged upon them the necessity of always being neat and trim while on duty, as the appearance of an officer generally indicated the way in which a city's affairs were conducted. The few remarks of Mayor Little were listened to with interest, and were fully appreciated by the men. Sergt. Jenkins put the force through several movements, which were properly executed. Chief Williams inspected the outfits, and then the men left for their beats or their homes.
