A GOOD MAN GONE. Madrid, Sept. 24.—Marshal Ansenio Martinez de Campos, aged 66 years, died Sunday morning at Zarauz, near San Sabastian.

By the death of Gen. Campos, Spain loses one of her noblest sons. For more than 40 years he had been an important factor in all of Spain's military movements and political changes. Campos fought for his country in two conquests of Morocco, which put an end to piracy on that coast. He served under Gen. Prim in Mexico, and saw service in Cuba during the early days of the ten years' war. He was recalled to Spain and became a leader against the Carlist rebellion. He united with Gen. Jovellar in the support the pronunciamento of Sagasta which made Alphonso XII. King of Spain, after a contest of seven years. After his subjugation of the Carlists in 1876, Campos was made commanderin-chief of the Spanish army. In that capacity he returned to Cuba, and by conciliatory methods brought about peace, which harsh methods had failed to secure. He was sent back to Cuba in 1895, but his sympathies was with the islanders, and he refused to lead a campaign of slaughter. Weyler succeeded him, and since his return to Spain the old general had been living in comparative retirement. His manity stands out in every act of his life, and this entitles him to greater honor than would half a century of successful bloodshed.
