KILLED BY A SAW.

Kingston, Feb. 16.—Thos. Gillespie, Pittsburg township, 30 years old, was instantly killed yesterday by the bursting of a circular saw, used in cutting wood. A large piece pierced through his body.

GOT 14 YEARS.

Peterboro, Ont., Feb. 16.—William Northcote, charged with burglary and setting fire to the buildings burglarized, was found guilty by Police Magistrate Dumble, and sentenced to 14 years in Kingston Penitentiary.

THE KELLER-BARKER SHOOTING.

New York, Feb. 16.—The Herald says: Legal counsel of the highest order will be employed to defend the Rev. John Keller, of Arlington, N. J., who was recently shot, and seriously wounded by Thomas G. Barker, the latter believing that he was avenging a wrong done to his wife. Funds for this purpose will be supplied by Dean Hoffman, of the General Theological Seminary.

THE PURSUIT OF GEN. DEWET!

Lord Kitchener and His Staff to Superintend the Boer Fox-Chase.

Optimistic Views of One of Buller's Brigade Commanders—A Fifth Contingent From Australia—Boers Invade Zululand.

London, Feb. 18.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from De Aar, dated Feb. 16, confirms the report of the arrival there of Lord Kitchener and his staff to superintend the chase of Gen. Dewet. The correspondent says: "Dewet's force is now denuded of almost all transport vehicles, and his horses are exhausted."

Other South African dispatches report that several columns are pursuing Gen. Dewet whose exact whereabouts, however, is not indicated.

Dispatches from Pretoria announce that the Carolina commando has broken through Gen. French's cordon westward.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANT.

The war office has made the following announcement: "Lord Kitchener having expressed a desire for a financial assistant in view of the heavy expenditure proceeding in South Africa, the secretary of state for war has appointed Guy Douglas Arthur Fleetwood Wilson, under secretary of state for war, to proceed to South Africa and to act temporarily as financial adviser to Lord Kitchener. Mr. Wilson leaves Saturday."

OPTIMISTIC OPINION.

One of Gen. Buller's brigade commanders in the Natal campaign asserts with an air of confidence that hostilities will be at an end by July 1, and that the final skirmishes will occur in the Stutterheim district. This forecast may not be more trustworthy than scores of guesses which have preceded it, but a spirit of optimism now prevails among British officers here, and the end of the war is currently believed to be in sight. They explain that Gen. Kitchener has been massing his infantry along the lines of command, and organizing two large mounted commands back upon the Swaziland frontier, and Gen. Kitchener himself is at De Aar, directing the series of large mounted columns in pursuit of Dewet.

DRIVING THE GAME.

Time has been required for the various concentrations and equipments, but mobile columns are now available for beating wide districts and driving the game before them. Gen. French is clearing the eastern district of the Transvaal, and forcing Botha's scattered commandos back upon the Swaziland frontier, and Gen. Kitchener himself is at De Aar, directing the series of large mounted columns in pursuit of Dewet.

DEWET'S AIM.

French's operations, while not decisive, are most harassing for he has captured a portion of an ammunition convoy and droves of cattle and many horses, and in clearing the country he has cut a wide swath from Belfast to Ermelo. Dewet, with Plumer's Australian bushmen, close behind him, has struck the railway north of De Aar and lost a portion of his ammunition and supplies. His object in invading Cape Colony has probably been to attempt to connect the Hertzog's, Kruger's and his own forces, and in substituting a general uprising among the Dutch by the capture of some important stronghold on the lines of communication.

KITCHENER AT THE FRONT.

Kitchener is where he can mass his mounted forces and the colonial defence troops and set one column after another in motion against Dewet. Old soldiers here do not believe that the Boers will escape, but Dewet is a wily fox. As for the disaffected districts, they are converted from disloyalty by the looting of their property and the confiscation of their horses and cattle.

TWO WEEKS OF GOOD WORK.

The campaign has been ended prematurely by the military experts so many times that they are warned against expressing any opinion with emphasis, but without doubt they have valid reasons for being greatly encouraged by the results of the last fortnight's work.

General Hunter, whose services in South Africa have been brilliant and successful, has returned to England in impaired health and received a warm welcome from his military friends. He divides honors with Lord Roberts, having never been beaten, and having compelled a large force of Boers to surrender.

REINFORCEMENTS.

About 1,200 troops, including drafts of mounted infantry and yeomanry, embarked at Southampton Saturday for South Africa. The reinforcements from England and the colonies will number 30,000 by the end of April.

AUSTRALIA'S FIFTH.

Melbourne, Feb. 18.—The fifth Victorian contingent, 1,250 men all told, sailed for South Africa Saturday.

BOERS IN ZULULAND.

London, Feb. 18.—A dispatch from Durban says it is reported that the Boers have entered Zululand and burned a hotel in the Nondweni gold fields.

ARMED NATIVES.

In an interview with some of the British residents of Zoutspanberg, in the Northern Transvaal, they declared that they had been well treated until they were ejected a fortnight ago. The

ters asking for their co-operation. Von Walderssee says: "Owing to the unsatisfactory nature of the negotiations for peace, and also to circumstances rendering such a course desirable, it will probably be necessary to resume military operations on a large scale, especially toward the west."

It is expected that the destination of the proposed expedition is Sian Fu. The foreign envoys believe its object to be to compel the Chinese to accept the terms of the powers.

It is thought that when it becomes known that the expedition has started the imperial court will hasten to comply immediately with all the demands of the joint note.

UNNECESSARY PREPARATIONS.

London, Feb. 16.—Dr. Morrison, in a dispatch to the Times from Peking, dated Thursday, describes the international scheme for the defense of the legation quarter as exhibiting an exaggerated fear of the strength of disarmed China. He says: "The scheme is equivalent to the construction of international forts alongside the imperial palace."

The correspondent concludes as follows: "After reading this remarkable defence scheme, Lord Lansdowne must admit that the logical outcome is the building of similar fortresses for the protection of the Legation quarter of the various nations at treaty ports. He will also see that if the court should elect to remain in the province of Shen Si its decision would not be wholly inexcusable."

USED REVOLVERS AS WELL AS HATCHETS

In Smashing Kansas Joints—Outlets Flow With Whisky and Beer—Drugs Store Wrecked.

Arkansas City, Kan., Feb. 18.—Seventy men, led by the ministers of this city, crossed the Arkansas River Saturday and demolished the joints and saloons. All the "joints" here had been closed for several days, but the "Last Chance," being outside the city limits, its proprietor continued to do a flourishing business. When the crowd swept down on the place the bartender was asleep. He was backed into a corner at a revolver's point and witnessed the complete demolition of the fixtures and stock.

Windfall, Kan., Feb. 18.—Intense ill-feeling, aroused here by the recent destruction of the "joints," and which led to dozens of street fights and the arming of many citizens for self-protection, apparently has died out. "Jointists" are removing what is left of their property to places of safety, but insist on remaining in the city. Their action may, it is feared, start the trouble afresh.

Perry, Kan., Feb. 18.—Fifteen prominent women, led by the wives of a Methodist minister and a bank cashier, raided several "joints" Friday night. With hatchets and axes they demolished fixtures right and left, entailing a loss in that particular alone of more than \$1,000.

Two whiskey barrels and 62 kegs and 20 cases of beer were carried into the streets, where they were chopped into kindling wood, and their contents flowed away into the gutters.

A drug store was the last place visited. The proprietor was accused of quenching the thirst of local inebriates and his stock was quickly destroyed. In striking at the shelves with her hatchet one of the women accidentally struck a bottle of carbolic acid. The deadly fluid bespattered her clothing and hands, burning her quite severely.

Robert McGowan Dickey Moffatt, clerk of railways, banking and commerce, House of Commons, died last night at Ottawa, a victim of pneumonia. He was 61 years old.
