Takes Its Place Among Practical Improvements.

French Mediterranean Navy to Give It Decisive Tests—Steamer Stranded -Suicide of a British Government Official.

Toulon, Jan. 9.—It has been decided to provide the entire French Mediterranean squadron with wireless telegraph, which will be subject to decisive tests during the coming cruise of that squadron. The recent experiments showed that dispatches can be exchanged reliably at distances of from 18 to 20 miles. New lights will also be tried, with the view of introducing reform in tactical signalng.

Desperate attempts to rescue her company by lifeboats and steam tugs were made yesterday, and wind is blowing a hurricane with no

signs of abatement. A great crowd is assembed along board the doomed ship, which is bumping heavily as the seas dash over her. Rockets have been fired, but each time the line has fallen short.
As darkness fell this evening the authorities were assembled on shore, Sebastopol is full of vessels, and the difeboats were lying off awaiting the first opportunity to effect a rescue; but the latest dispatch from the lighthouse-keeper at Faraman describes the position of the steamer as hopeless. It is probable that the ves-sel and all on board will perish.

THE POSTOFFICE.

Great Increase of Volume at a Slight Cost-Official Figures for the

Ottawa, Jan, 9.—The annual report of the postmaster-general for the year 1899-1900 has been printed and dis-tributed. In the matter of postal revenue it should be remembered that year was the first during the whole of which the reduction of domestic post-age from three to two cents per ounce, and of the inter-imperial postage from five to two cents per half ounce had been effected, the higher rates having prevailed during the first half of the previous year.
