The Government Road.

The Minister of Railways had the satisfaction yesterday of announcing another financial surplus in the year's operations of the Intercolonial Railroad. The earnings for the nine months ending March 31, 1903, were \$4,745,000, and for the corresponding period last year \$4,184,000. The working expenses for the nine months ending March 31, 1903, were \$4,775,500 and in the same period last year \$4,197,500. May and June are among the best earning months and the minister estimates a surplus of \$125,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30 next, as compared with a surplus of \$96,000 for 1902. Mr. Blair may point with pardonable pride to these results, as a vindication of his virile and aggressive policy. The extension to Montreal and the modernization of the road have been the two chief factors in lifting the Intercolonial out of the rut. The purchase of larger locomotives and freight cars, capable of carrying greater loads, has cut down enormously the cost of handling traffic. When the present administration took hold of the Intercolonial it was equipped with 35, 40 and 45 ton engines, capable of hauling only 150, 180 and 200 tons of freight, at the same outlay for labor, fuel and management as is required for hauling 800 and 1,000 tons with the new rolling stock. If the road with this old equipment had had to handle the volume of business which passed over it this year, the deficit in Mr. Blair's opinion, would be a million dollars. In addition to new rolling stock, the roadbed has been improved, heavier rails have been laid down, terminals enlarged and the whole line brought up to an excellent standard. During the past year half a million dollars more was spent in the betterment of the road than in the last year under the old administration; and this money came out of the year's earnings, not out of capital. In the past seven years the business of the line has more than doubled. The gross earnings and the working expenses since 1896-97 have been:

For the fiscal year 1902-03, which ends on June 30 next, the earnings will show a large increase over the year 1901-02. The Intercolonial has cost this country to date \$68,645,582. It was built for political reasons in defiance of geography, and for that reason may never be a good commercial proposition, judged by the tests that apply to a railroad under private ownership. But if it cannot be made to yield a rate of interest on the outlay, it appears to be reaching a position where it will no longer be an actual burden on the public, but will be able to support itself if it does not pay its past debts. There is a probability that it will become a working partner of the new Grand Trunk Pacific, the latter handing over its winter export business at Quebec to the Intercolonial for conveyance to St. John and Halifax. An arrangement of this kind may mean a new era for the Government road. It is altogether likely, also, that it will be extended in the near future to Georgian Bay.

The Treadgold Concession.

An attempt is being made to fasten another Yukon scandal on the Dominion Government over what is known as the Treadgold concession. In the early days of mining development in the Yukon the rich yield in the placer diggings could be taken out with ease and at trifling cost, but as the beds along the creeks became exhausted the work became increasingly difficult because of the scarcity of water with which to wash out the gold in the less auriferous deposits. Expensive hydraulic machinery became necessary, and this could only be supplied at a large outlay. The work would be too expensive for the individual miners. A large waterworks system was required, just as in a municipality, where each citizen could not be expected to furnish his own water supply. The Dominion Government was asked by the Yukon Board of Trade to undertake these works at public expense, but after looking into the matter found that the capital outlay would be \$4,000,000 or \$5,000,000. The Government did not feel that it would be warranted in so huge an expenditure, but recognized that some system should be established for collecting water to afford facilities to the miners to work their claims. Private enterprise was the only alternative. A company headed by Mr. Treadgold, an English capitalist, offered to undertake the work under certain conditions, and a contract was made in the

summer of 1901, under which the syndicate was given the sole right to divert and take water from the Klondike River at any point or points between its entry into the Yukon River and Flat Creek for the purpose of generating power with which to pump water to work the auriferous deposits in the district, comprising the beds, banks, valleys, slopes and hills of the Klondike River, of Bonanza, Bear and Hunter Creeks, and of their tributaries. The work was in the nature of things monopolistic, as is a waterworks system in any community. The head waters had to be dammed, and it was impossible to have more than one dam, so that the system had to be controlled by a single management. The original contract with the Treadgold people met with opposition, and a delegation of miners waited on the Government, representing, among other things, that the price of the water to be sold to miners by the company had been fixed at too high a rate—\$1 per miner's inch. A miner's inch is a volume of water 12 feet square, or a flow of one and a half cubic feet a minute. The Government reduced the price to 25 cents, and as the miners claimed that this price was still exorbitant the Government canceled all the orders-in-council passed in the year 1901, and made the water rates subject to its own control. It went further and gave the miners of the Klondike a primary right to a flow of water sufficient to carry on their operations. The paragraph in the new order-in-council reads:

"Licensed holders of mining locations on the Klondike River shall be entitled as against the grantees (the syndicate) to the use, free from toll, of a flow of water sufficient for working their claims, but not exceeding in all 3,500 miner's inches, equal to 5,250 cubic feet per minute." The rights of the miners are thus guarded in two ways: they have the first claim on any water impounded by the company, and the latter must sell at the price dictated by the Government. The Government granted the miners other concessions. In the first order-in-council, the syndicate was given the right to work all claims abandoned by miners. Now it has no more right than any miner, and it cannot possess an abandoned claim until it pays water to it. The company under the original contract was also given the exclusive privilege of laying and using bed-rock flumes. The Government, in deference to the views of the miners, canceled this provision, and now every person has the same privilege.

This, briefly, is the history of the Treadgold concession. Would the people of Canada have supported the Government in expending \$4,000,000 or \$5,000,000 to provide a water supply for the Yukon miners? The nature of mining in the Yukon is not yet assured, and the Government did not feel warranted in making this huge outlay, which might or might not prove reproductive. If the country was not to stand still, however, some large scheme was necessary for the development of power and the pumping of water. The only method, other than undertaking it as a public work, was to intrust it to a private company. The Treadgold syndicate has spent \$50,000 in investigating and exploring the territory, but so far has failed to attract sufficient capital to prosecute the enterprise. This entirely disposes of the fairy tale that the concession it has secured is a bonanza, though in the interests of the Yukon it is to be hoped the work will be proceeded with and prove profitable to the promoters. The Government has safeguarded the miners by retaining control of rates. This is the proper principle in dealing with public franchises. It is admitted that there is still much dissatisfaction in the Yukon over the grant, and the Government has promised a thorough investigation of the whole problem; but it appears to have conscientiously tried to do its duty, and there is no ground for aspersing its motives.
