IT WAS PROBABLY PROVIDENTIAL

Did Not Eventuate.

THE BARRIER IDEA OVERDONE

Had the Ceremony Taken Place Official Negligence Might Have Caused Terrible Disaster.

London, July 1 .- No one can appreciate the magnitude of the disaster which, possibly, has been averted by the failure of the coronation parade to eventuate. It may be that before the coronation is held at last those responsible for the erection of barriers here and there on the public streets may see the error of their ways and do things differently.

Barriers were, of course, necessary for the handling of so large a crowd as that which flocked to London to attend the coronation, but the thing, it is now generally admitted, was considerably overdone. Someone in official circles went barrier mad.

At immense expense and labor barriers as stout as lock gates built to resist a thousand-ton pressure of water were placed at every available place along the route of the procession.

Navvies were engaged to quarry holes in the roads verging from the abbey, planting therein square-cut posts a foot each way and fastening to them hinges of monster size. Gaps were considerately left for traffic, but gaps so small that a 'bus driver required the skill of a charioteer in "Ben Hur" or an artillery driver in the military tournament to get between without damage to his vehicle and passengers.

At the jubilee barriers were found very useful in the case of one end of St. Paul's churchyard and some of the small streets near the route, but the builders wisely constructed special pits into which the posts could be slipped at the last minute and taken out again, thus leaving the streets unim-

peded for the crowds at night. What would have happened when crowd met crowd at one of these narrow openings may be imagined. They were a nuisance days before the time for the ceremony. On the day of the coronation they would have been a menace to life.

Equally to blame with those responsible for the barriers were the officials who built the Temple Bar arch on the narrowest footway in the narrowest main thoroughfare in the city. The ed above. a committee of bishops. Two ministers and two laymen from the diocese of Central Pennsylvania, Maryland and Central New York, constitute the membership of the board. Rev. J. B. S. Hodgins, Baltimore, acted as chairman of the board, and Rev. Dr. F. C. Foley, of Williamsport, was secretary; Charles B. Mc-Conkey, of Harrisburg, was church advocate, the duty of which is to act

as advisory council to the board.

Rev. Dr. N. W. Irvine, formerly rector of St. John's Episcopal Church, Huntingdon, Pa., was unfrocked by Bishop Talbot because of his refusal to give communion to Mrs. Emma D. Elliott, an influential member of the parish, on account of her having been three times divorced, and married after the last divorce to her present husband, who had himself been divorced on the uncanonical ground of desertion. The matter was referred to Bishop Talbot, with the result not-

Elliott against him (Irvine). Irvine charged that he referred the matter of refusing communion to Mrs. Elliott to the bishop, and the latter said that, of course, she must be re-fused. Then, it is charged, the bishop and Mrs. Elliott entered into com-munication, and the prelate soon shifted his ground. The affair involves many vital questions affecting the welfare of the church and bids fair to become a national scandal. Bishop Talbot and Dr. Irvine were college mates.

The earnings for the last quarter not only exceed the most sanguine estimates of the directors, but are far in excess of the published quarterly earnings of any company or trust in the history of finance or business.

The earnings for the last three months reach the stupendous sum of \$37,691,696, with the earnings of June estimated at \$12,250,000. It is wholly probable that this estimate is a conservative one, and that the earnings for June will amount to more than \$12,-

The reason for believing that the estimate will fall short of the reality is that the statement issued last quarter gave the estimated earnings for March at \$9,500,000, whereas the actual figures given now show that they were \$10,-135,858, or \$635,858 in excess of the estimate.


