IT WAS PROBABLY PROVIDENTIAL!

That the Coronation Parade Did Not Eventuate.

THE BARRIER IDEA OVERTHROWN

Had the Ceremony Taken Place Official Recognition Might Have Caused Terrible Disaster.

London, July 1.—No one can appreciate the magnitude of the disaster which, possibly, has been averted by the failure of the coronation parade to eventuate. It may be that before the coronation is held at last those responsible for the erection of barriers here and there on the public streets may see the error of their ways and do things differently.

Barriers were, of course, necessary for the handling of so large a crowd as that which flocked to London to attend the coronation, but the thing, it is now generally admitted, was considerably overdone. Someone in official circles went barrier mad.

At immense expense and labor barriers as stout as log gates built to resist a thousand-ton pressure of water were placed at every available place along the route of the procession.

Natives were engaged to quarry holes in the roads verging from the abbey, planting therein square-cut posts a foot each way and fastening to them hinges of monster size. Gaps were considerably left for traffic, but gaps so small that a bus driver required the skill of a charioteer in "Ben Hur" or an artillery driver in the military tournament to get between without damage to his vehicle and passengers.

At the jubilee barriers were found very useful in the case of one end of St. Paul's churchyard and some of the small streets near the route, but the builders wisely constructed special pits into which the posts could be slipped at the last minute and taken out again, thus leaving the streets unimpeded for the crowds at night.

What would have happened when crowd met crowd at one of these narrow openings may be imagined. They were a nuisance days before the time for the ceremony. On the day of the coronation they would have been a menace to life.

Equally to blame with those responsible for the barriers were the officials who built the Temple Bar arch on the narrowest footway in the narrowest main thoroughfare in the city. The arch was a flimsy structure, liable to keel over under the pressure of a great crowd.

Another obstruction was presented in the stand which took up half the footway in front of the law courts, and yet another in the stand which the officials took to the narrowest footway. Both were flagrant violations of the rights of foot passengers; both were a menace to life.

IN NEWFOUNDLAND

Revenue for Fiscal Year Larger Than Ever Before.

St. John's, Nfld., July 3.—The colonial revenue for the fiscal year ended June 30 is the largest in the history of the colony. It amounts to almost \$2,200,000, and is \$120,000 in excess of the revenue for the preceding fiscal year.

A large surplus is certain, but the exact amount cannot be ascertained. The financial condition of the colony was never better than it is today. The custom house receipts at the port of St. John for the last quarter reached \$550,000, a sum largely in excess of previous receipts.

The local loan for public works, which was floated Monday, was subscribed four times over, and the offers went above par.

UNBECOMING TO A BISHOP

Charges Against a Presbyterian Minister Investigated.

A Thrice-Divorced Influential Woman the Cause of Trouble.

Harrisburg, Pa., July 3.—The examination into the charges of conduct unbecoming a bishop, preferred against Bishop Talbot, of the Episcopal Church, by Rev. Dr. Ingram N. W. Irvine, of Philadelphia, was conducted in executive session by the Presbytery of the Episcopal Church, by Bishop Dudley, of Kentucky, and after hearing the testimony of Dr. Irvine, whom the accused bishop unrobed while serving as rector at St. John's parish, Huntington, Pa., and other witnesses, the board adjourned without making public its verdict.

Bishop Talbot was not present at the investigation, which was held to determine whether or not there was sufficient evidence for holding the bishop for trial, which, according to the episcopal canons, would be before a committee of the Presbytery of the diocese of Central Pennsylvania. Maryland and Central New York, constitute the membership of the board. Rev. J. B. S. Hodgins, Baltimore, acted as chairman of the board, and Rev. Dr. F. C. Foley, of Williamsport, was secretary. Charles B. McKim, of Harrisburg, was church advocate, the duty of which is to act as advisory council to the board.

Rev. Dr. Irvine, formerly rector of St. John's Episcopal Church, Huntington, Pa., was unrobed by Bishop Talbot because of his refusal to communion to Mrs. Emma D. Elliott, an influential member of the parish, on account of her having been three times divorced, and married to a man who had himself been divorced on the uncanonical ground of desertion. The matter was referred to Bishop Talbot, with the result not above. Then Dr. Irvine brought charges against the bishop, alleging that he formed a conspiracy with Mrs. Elliott to remove her from the parish.

Dr. Irvine charged that he referred the matter of refusing communion to Mrs. Elliott to the bishop, and the bishop refused. Then, it is charged, the bishop and Mrs. Elliott entered into communication, and the bishop made a statement to the effect that he would remove her from the parish. The affair involves many vital questions affecting the welfare of the church and bids fair to lead to a schism in the Episcopal Church.

FAST TRAINS TO CHICAGO

New York Central's Express Service Added To.

George H. Daniels, General Passenger Agent of the New York Central, today, taking yesterday, the company's fast train service, said that, in addition to the new 20-hour train, there are now four fast trains to Chicago, and two Empire State express daily.

The Twentieth Century Limited, 20-hour train, leaves New York every day at 2:45 p.m., and arrives at Chicago the next morning at 9:45. The Lake Shore Limited leaves New York at 5:30 a.m., and arrives at Chicago the next morning at 4:30. The Fast Mail, a fine 24-hour train, leaves New York at 8:45 a.m., evening day, reaching Chicago the next morning at 11:50. The 24-hour train, really 23 hours and 50 minutes. The Detroit and Chicago Limited leaves New York at 4 p.m., reaching Chicago the next afternoon, a fourth 24-hour train.

Note: The New York Central has 15 trains a day between New York and Buffalo and Niagara Falls; 5 trains a day between New York and St. Louis; 4 trains a day between New York and Cincinnati; 4 trains a day between New York and Montreal, and by its Boston and Albany Division 4 trains a day between New York and Boston via Springfield.

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STEEL COMBINE'S BIG BUSINESS!

Earnings This Year Were Over \$150,000,000

PROFITS WERE VERY LARGE

Net Earnings for the Last Six Months \$64,407,153, Says the Official Report.

New York, July 3.—The semi-annual report of the United States Steel Corporation has been made public. The earnings for the last quarter not only exceed the most sanguine estimates of the directors, but are far in excess of the published quarterly earnings of any company or trust in the history of finance or business.

The earnings for the last three months reach the stupendous sum of \$37,691,696, with the earnings of June estimated at \$12,550,000. It is wholly probable that this estimate is a conservative one, and that the earnings for June will amount to more than \$12,550,000.

The reason for believing that the estimate will fall short of the reality is that the statement issued last quarter gave the estimated earnings for March at \$9,500,000, whereas the actual figures given now show that they were \$10,135,855, or \$635,855 in excess of the estimate.

It is therefore possible, and even probable, that the real earnings for the last quarter will amount to more than \$38,000,000, when the exact figures are known.

The total earnings for the last six months are given as \$64,407,153, a sum very much larger than the capital of nearly any one of the big trusts, with the exception, of course, of the very great ones, such as the Standard Oil, American Sugar, etc. If the present rate of earnings is maintained the net earnings for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1903, will be more than \$150,000,000, as compared with \$111,067,195 last year.

Deductions from the net earnings for the six months are as follows: Sinking funds on bonds and subsidiary companies, depreciation and reserve funds, \$7,964,458. Interest on United States Steel bonds for six months, \$1,600,000. Sinking fund for United States Steel bonds for six months, \$1,600,000. Dividends on preferred and common stocks and outstanding stocks of subsidiary companies, \$28,027,074, leaving undivided profits for the six months, \$29,492,623.

These undivided profits are applicable to increase the depreciation and reserve fund accounts, new construction or surplus. The 3½ per cent dividend on preferred stock amounts to \$17,500,000, and the 2 per cent dividend on common stock amounts to \$10,166,633. The dividends on outstanding stocks of subsidiary companies amount to only \$11,000,000.

The net profits for the six months amount to \$48,490,657, after all the deduction for sinking funds, interest on bonds, etc., are made, or about \$55,000,000 for each quarter. This is how the items look in tabular form:
