BRITAIN WILL BE GENEROUS

She Will Also Be Watchful Desires Boers to Retain the Best Characteristics of Their Race.

London, July 30 .- In the House of Commons yesterday, in the course of his address, Colonial Secretary Chainberlain said that regarding South Africa, Lord Milner, the high commissioner, had telegraphed spontaneously that he did not think further legislation young men and their sweethearts, who necessary to make the banishment had invaded "Capt." Streeter's domain proclamation effective. The government, however, reserved to itself the important right in the new colonies to refuse to allow the return or to keep watch over certain persons who show-ed themselves inimical to good order

and peace. "We are not going to allow the result of the war to be undone," said Chamberlain, "by intrigues carried on by nominally constitutional means." Regarding the future status of South Africa, the colonial secretary said the Imperial Government had es-

tablished A CROWN COLONY,

in the strictest sense. The next step would be to add a nominated official element. Thereafter there would be an elected official element and then nothing but circumstances and time would separate the new colonies from full self-government, the ultimate goal of their ambition. That consummation would not be delayed if for no other reason, because it might relieve the government of the tremendous bur-den of responsibility involved in the street with Miss Marion Raymond. His present situation; but all must understand that the government would not be rushed or hustled into any action which circumstances did not warrant. Mr. Chamberlain went on to say that he was one of those optimistic enough to believe the new colonies would reach the ultimate goal of their ambition much sooner than many persons now thought possible. So far as the government was concerned, the surrender promises would be kept in spirit as well as in letter. The government, he said, was bound both by honor and interest to this course. There remained

many questions to be dealt with; a A NEW TARIFF must be arranged, involving intricate questions concerning which experts must be consulted, and the taxation of mines must be settled, but he wished to say that nothing would be done to punish owners of mines, as had been suggested in many quarters. The government would do nothing to interfere with a quick revival of development of

the country.
Subject to that consideration, Mr. Chamberlain continued, no man was more anxious than he to recover some considerable part of the cost of the war from South Africa. He thought it would be perfectly fair to lay a fair part of the cost of the war on the principal industry of the Transvael

PLEASED HIS OPPONENTS. Mr. Chamberlain's speech won the applause even of such opponents as Henry Labouchere. He dealt compre-hensively with the past and future of South Africa. "We have no intention," he declared, "that the Boers should break with their old traditions. We have no intention," he declared, "that the bound traditions we desire that they should break with their old traditions. preserve all the best characteristics of their race, and hope they will shake hands with us, thus securing prosperity in South Africa under the flag which protects different races and different religions.'

That sentiment was the keynote of Dealing with the much-discussed labor question, Mr. Chamberlain said he believed every inducement to labor should be held out to the blacks, but he said no scheme of compulsory labor would receive the slightest government support. Lord Milner, it is learned from the blue-book, admits that he previously believed such early legislative co-operation between the two nationalities to be impossible.
