WINTER CAMPAIGN IN THE BALKANS

Cold and Hunger To Be Added to Present Sufferings

OF THE STRICKEN MACEDONIANS

The German Press Blames U. S. for Starting Fresh Riots at Beirut—Saratoff Reported Wounded.

London, Sept. 9.—The Sofia correspondent of the Times says the insurgents have laid up large stores of provisions in the mountains and even contemplate a winter campaign. The suffering of the women and children, therefore, entitled will be appalling, but the insurgent leaders believe that the ill-clad Turkish troops will suffer more than themselves, owing to their inability to obtain supplies in a devastated country with interrupted communications. He continues: "Any active interference on the part of the powers seems past praying for. Russia and Germany are urging the Sultan to adopt more vigorous methods of repression, while the other powers have apparently no advice to offer, and content themselves with an attitude of disinterested spectators."

The Athens correspondent of the Times writes that Count Lamoriniere, the Russian Foreign Minister, has declared his opinion that the Bulgarian bands are guilty of greater tyranny and devastation than the Turkish troops, and that it would be necessary to warn the Bulgarians that they will not succeed in involving Russia in an armed intervention against the Turks, and further that Russia will not permit a change in the status quo by the creation of an autonomous Macedonia or the appointment of a Christian governor.

THE BEIRUT AFFAIR.

Washington, Sept. 9.—A cablegram from the Turkish foreign office to Chelkib Bey, the Turkish minister here, gives the following version of the trouble at Beirut Sunday, reported by U. S. Admiral Cotton in his dispatch to the navy department: "Some Christians of the city of Beirut attacked four Muslims, and during the melee which followed four persons were injured. Three of these were soldiers. Two persons are dead, one of whom is a soldier."

The minister is in receipt of a dispatch from Constantinople characterizing as "absolutely false" the published reports that there was no security in Constantinople, and that Muslims and the imperial troops were responsible for massacres and the getting into houses in Roumania.

This dispatch was in reply to one sent by the minister calling the attention of his government to the reports of this character. Another dispatch received says that 22 Bulgarian brigands were killed in the vicinity of Ram (Monastir), and 40 others on a farm at Prohomania.

BLAMES THE UNITED STATES.

Berlin, Sept. 9.—The newspapers this morning, in commenting on Sunday's outbreaks at Beirut, throw the blame for the occurrence on the United States.

The Lokai Anzeiger says: "Now that the Americans have their dead they will hardly inquire whether they were responsible for the effusion of blood in Beirut. By the unprecedented action of their minister in Constantinople and their naval demonstration, the yearning of the United States to mix up in European politics has found some justification."

The Nation Zeitung says: "It can be seen how serious the view of the excitement in the near east, to spread incorrect or bad translations of cipher reports."

LIVE STOCK MEN WILL COME IN FORCE TO THE WESTERN

Exhibits at the Big Show Will Be Best Ever.

Ottawa and Guelph Trying To Attract Exhibitors.

Making Offers of Guarantees, Etc.—Toronto Will Allow Live Stock Out at 4 p.m., Friday.

Messrs. William Moore, of this city, and Charles Treblecock, of London Township, members of the live stock committee of the Western Fair Board, have just returned from Toronto, where they were in attendance at the Dominion Exhibition, making arrangements for live stock exhibits for the Western Fair.

To the Advertiser today Mr. Moore said that the Western Fair had a strong hold upon live stock men, and that despite the efforts of the Ottawa and Guelph people, the exhibit of live stock this year would be larger and better than heretofore.

The Ottawa fair management is doing its best to pull exhibits away from London, by offering big inducements. Guelph is going so far as to guarantee premiums which will more than make up for necessary expenses if exhibitors will give the London exhibition the early and exhibit at Guelph.

MR. HYMAN GUARDED LONDON'S INTERESTS.

A CUBAN DUEL

Was Fought With Rapier and One May Die.

Havana, Sept. 9.—A duel was fought yesterday between an employee of the supreme court and a colonel in the Cuban army. The latter applied for a place in the Audiencia, and his communication was referred to the supreme court employee for a report as to his character. The report was not favorable to the colonel, and he wrote an insulting letter to its author. A challenge to a duel followed, and the men met and fought with rapiers. The colonel was very badly wounded.

TROUBLE IN LEBANON

Cairo Hears Reports of Massacres by Bedouins.

Paris, Sept. 9.—The following telegram from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Cairo, Sept. 8, states: "The situation in regard to the situation in Syria. Bedouins arriving here from the Arab desert say the Druses are in a panic and are fleeing in all directions. A massacre in Lebanon."

Lebanon (the White Mountain) is a mountain chain of Syria, extending from the city of Antioch 24 miles to the Mediterranean, near Sidon. The whole range is composed of a white limestone (whence its name) and abounds with cultivated grounds and villages, inhabited by a race of hardy mountaineers.

WILL HAVE A NEW LIFEBOAT

Port Stanley Life-Saving Crew To Get a Better Craft.

The old lifeboat at Port Stanley has been used for 25 years, and Dr. Wilson has for some time been urging the department to provide a more seaworthy one. The department's efforts have been successful, for he has received notice from the marine department at Ottawa that the minister, Hon. Raymond Prentiss, has approved of the recommendation that a new lifeboat should be provided for the lifesaving crew at Port Stanley.

OFFICER BATTLES WITH MADMAN IN FRONT OF AN ONCOMING TRAIN

By Superhuman Effort, Throws Himself and Lunatic Clear of the Track.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Sept. 9.—Police Dehaan, who was recently adjudged insane, made a dash for freedom yesterday morning at the Union depot and succeeded in breaking away from Deputy Sheriff Verkerke, who was conducting him to the asylum at Kalamazoo. Dehaan ran over the main tracks, and when overpowered by Verkerke, offered resistance. The men clinched and fell across the rails just as the north-bound Grand Rapids and Indiana train was approaching the depot. A desperate struggle followed. Verkerke heard the warning whistle and saw his impending danger, but Dehaan paid no heed to the rapidly approaching engine, being evidently determined to hold the deputy's head across the rail until both were crushed by the train. The engineer applied the brakes and reversed, but could not check the speed in time, as the men were less than 100 feet from the nose of the pilot pushed by. It required three men to take Dehaan back to jail.

CZAR DICTATES TO THE CHINESE

Terms Upon Which Russia Will Evacuate Provinces

WILL STILL BE ALL POWERFUL

Insists Upon Retaining Military Telegraphs—Promises to Move Her Troops on October 8.

London, Sept. 9.—The Pekin correspondent of the Times telegraphs that M. Lessor, the Russian minister, in his note to the Wai-Wu-Pu regarding the New Chwang and Moukden Province, should be evacuated by the Russians on Oct. 8, understood that China shall be permitted to resume administrative rights in three provinces of Manchuria, provided that on her part China undertakes that no portion of the territory shall be conceded to any other power; that no concession shall be granted to Great Britain unless granted equally to Russia; that there shall be no increase in the present tariff on goods entering Manchuria by railway; that in the event of an epidemic at New Chwang a Russian health officer shall be appointed to deal with it; that Russia shall retain her own military telegraph along the railway, and that the agencies of the Russo-Chinese Bank in Manchuria shall be guarded by Chinese soldiers. If the above conditions are agreed to, New Chwang and Moukden shall be evacuated Oct. 8, and the remaining provinces in due course.

The correspondent commenting on the foregoing says: "It will thus be seen that in reference to the objections of the other powers the more objectionable features of the demands made by M. Plancin (who was recently Russian charge d'affaires in Pekin) have been omitted, and while Russia surrenders no material advantage she has gained time and can rest content that China will never act in any way counter to the Russian policy. She also saves the face of China, who will accept the altered conditions with alacrity. It is further hoped thereby to pacify Japan's resentment by apparently acceding to her wishes, while retaining absolute military control of the country and holding her to be able to push to completion undisturbed her military preparations."

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Pittsburg, Sept. 9.—In a dressing-room with walls studded with books, hang clothing on every hook, and a fire in the kitchen set fire to the building and "most people would say."

Brick, mortar, stone and steel are the materials, and the walls are up to the top, and the work on the inner frames is advanced.

CASTRO IS BLAMED

For Strained Relations Between Venezuela and Colombia.

Bogota, Sept. 9.—A heated discussion has taken place in both Houses of Congress on the recent troubles at Santander. Gen. Gonzalez Valencia will be removed from his command.

Senor Caro, in the Senate, of which he was recently elected president, affirmed that the attitude of Gen. Valencia made a rupture with Venezuela imminent.

The relations between Venezuela and Colombia have been extremely strained since President Castro lent active help to Gen. Uribe-Urbe and other revolutionists during the last rebellion. The exports and imports to Santander Province have been transported by way of Maracaibo, Venezuela, but obstacles have now been placed in the way which are ruining and exasperating the merchants of Santander to such an extent that Congress is discussing a bill authorizing the executive to build a railroad from Bacaramanga or Cucuta, Santander Province, to the Magdalena River, as the only solution to the situation, less costly than war.

A Big Oil Fire.

Port Arthur, Texas, Sept. 9.—The steamer City of Everett, which took fire yesterday, is still burning, and the Texas Company's oil derricks are entirely destroyed. The loss will amount to \$250,000.

No Plague at Santiago.

Havana, Sept. 9.—Dr. Gutierrez, of the health department, who went to the Province of Santiago to investigate the rumors of plague there, telegraphs that there is no yellow or black fever, or other epidemic at Santiago or Daiquiri. At Daiquiri there are some serious cases of malarial fever. Gov. Nunez has directed the mayor of Havana to order the removal of slot machines used for gambling from the cafes.

Bubonic at New Chwang.

Tientsin, China, Sept. 9.—An outbreak of bubonic plague is reported at New Chwang, where a score of deaths are occurring daily. Owing to the absence of sanitary control, the bodies of the victims have been left unburied, and it is feared that this will lead to a serious spread of the disease.

PETER AND THE PLOTTERS

The Nish Officers To Be Tried by Military Court.

London, Wednesday, Sept. 9.—Dispatches from Belgrade say Gen. Maglajenski and Capt. Loutkijewski, who was an aide-de-camp to the late King Alexander at the time of the assassination, were arrested in connection with the latest so-called conspiracy against King Peter by army officers who refuse to serve under the murderers of the former King and Queen. Gen. Maglajenski was afterwards released.

The Serbian legation in London has issued a communication from the Minister of Foreign Affairs at Belgrade, declaring that the alleged plot of army officers at Nish to kill the plotters who were responsible for the murder of King Alexander and Queen Draga, was exaggerated. The 25 officers arrested at Nish for being concerned in the conspiracy simply signed a protest which was not aimed at counter revolution, and was not directed against King Peter. These men will be dealt with by a military court.

A MURDER CASE AT THE FALLS

Italian Admits Killing a Countryman, But Declares It Was in Self-Defense.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Sept. 9.—Child Mains, of the Ontario police, received a telegram yesterday afternoon from Ridgeway, Pa., that a man named Giuseppe Bonaventura, alias Giuseppe Karrell, was wanted at that place for murder. In half an hour afterwards the chief had his man located and in custody. He located him at the Imperial Hotel here. The man, who is about 25 years old, is of the more intelligent class of Italians, and speaks English very well. He admits he killed the man (another Italian) a week ago last Monday, being the result of an Italian row, but he claims he did the killing in self-defense, firing two shots into the Italian's back, killing him instantly. He has a bullet in his own shoulder from the result of the fracas, and has been at the Imperial Hotel for the past three days getting better. He will go back to Ridgeway voluntarily. An officer is on the way here to take him back.

THE "SOO" BOOKS ARE IN CANADA

U. S. Stockholders May Start Litigation Through Canadian Courts.

Philadelphia, Sept. 9.—That the Consolidated Lake Superior Company, which has extensive interests on the great lakes and in Canada, and which is capitalized at more than \$100,000,000, will be involved in litigation with some of its stockholders, now seems inevitable. These stockholders, headed by E. Clarence Miller, a banker of this city, want to know the names, subscriptions and details of the \$11,000,000 underwriting syndicate. They claim that over \$10,000,000 of the syndicate's subscriptions are unaccounted for. Counsel for the stockholders last week threatened to bring mandamus proceedings and force the company to show its books. On Saturday an agreement was reached by which counsel for the stockholders were given to understand that the books of the company were open for their inspection. When counsel for the stockholders called at the company's office today they were told that the books had been removed to St. James, Canada. Counsel for the complaining stockholders will now bring suit against the company, and if they cannot reach the books through their inspection, they will declare they will apply to the Canadian courts.

Colonial Youth, English and American Universities.

'LABBY' ON ROTTEN COLONIES

Mormons in the Northwest Still Governed From Utah—Britain and New Zealand.

London, Sept. 9.—Mr. H. P. Biggar, a graduate of the University of Toronto, writing to the Times from Paris regarding the University of Oxford and colonial graduates, says that in view of the facilities for graduate study offered elsewhere, some effort should be made to improve the condition of affairs in England, if colonial graduates are to be attracted.

Mr. Biggar says the United States not only attracts but also retains some of the best Canadian youths. It seems pretty well agreed that the Rhodes scholarships will be a graduates' experiment, as the sending of colonial school boys to English universities has nearly always proved a failure. As Professor Watson pointed out at the conference, they come back to the colonies more English than Englishmen.

Truth in an article on the fiscal policy says that assuming the loyalty of the colonies can be bought the day would come when we would want to withdraw the bribe. We have abolished rotten boroughs at home only to substitute rotten colonies over sea, and having thoroughly corrupted them, sooner or later we should find this too costly, and refuse to continue to buy their loyalty.

NORMONS IN CANADA.

CHARGED WITH VAGRANCY

Arrest of Two Suspects Who May Be Wanted at Stratford.

John Campbell, a one-armed man, and Charles O. Bryan, were arrested last night by P. C. Lucas and locked up. This morning they were charged with being vagrants and the court remanded them for a week. In the meantime inquiries will be made as to the whereabouts of the two men, and as all people who come before the magistrate from this burg are held for a few days, the usual course will be taken to see if they are not crooks. Bryan may be the person who assaulted Nellie McTavish, a sixteen-year-old girl, near Stratford, last Saturday morning. In London the one-armed man did the begging and it was said that the man who is wanted in Stratford was accompanied by a one-armed beggar.

The man who was arrested on a charge of assaulting his wife and stepdaughter was arraigned but the case was adjourned until Saturday. A drunk was discharged.

BELL CEASED TOLLING

In deference to the Wishes of Congregation Who Were Disturbed.

A little incident has just occurred in this city which shows the good-will and concern that exists between the different denominations.

Not long since the Rev. W. J. Clark intimated to Bishop McEwen, in a kindly note, that the ringing of the big bell in St. Peter's Cathedral on Sunday morning disturbed the congregation of the First Presbyterian Church while it served. On Sunday the result of this note was made manifest, when the big bell of St. Peter's was not rung as usual, but only tolled slowly and softly at the Angelus.

Those who know the reason why the big bell was not rung, speak in the highest terms of the consideration shown by his Lordship the Bishop in this matter.

POLICE FIGHT A LYNCHING PARTY

Negro Had Killed White Man in a Chicago Street.

CALLED HIM CHICKEN THIEF

Patrolmen Have Desperate Battle To Drag Murderer from the Hands of Enraged Mob.

Chicago, Sept. 9.—Under a fire of bricks and stones policemen last night rescued a negro murderer from a mob of would-be lynchers. A few minutes before John Brinkley, a colored watchman, had shot and killed Charles McCarthy, a plasterer, almost in the presence of the latter's wife, who stood in the doorway holding her baby. Then the negro, backing into the doorway of his own quarters, held a crowd of 200 men and boys at bay until Patrolman Robert Mooney walked up to him and unarmed and took away his weapon. Then came the second and exciting attempt of the mob to break through the police line, and a desperate battle followed. The mob was finally broken up, and the murderer was taken to the police station. The police were aided by a patrol wagon. But as he did so, the crowd surged forward once more, with cries of "lynch him, lynch him," and a policeman tried in vain to force the door on the crowd and keep it closed, but even with the assistance of the new lynch mob, it was useless. While Mooney was thus struggling Brinkley turned and fled from the mob by the rear door
