

LONDON MARKET

London, Friday, Nov. 27. There was a fair supply of hay today, and the demand was slow; in fact, it was the dulllest day in several weeks for this important commodity. Sales were made at \$10 to \$12 per ton. Straw sold at \$7 per ton. There was a fair supply of oats, but prices did not advance, as sales were made at \$1.20 and \$1.22 per cwt. Wheat sold at 90c per bushel. Butter, eggs, and dressed hogs will be in good demand at Saturday's market.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

Toronto, Nov. 26.—A slightly better feeling to the market today, comparatively light runs this week, helped to bring the market up to nearer former levels prior to the recent sharp decline.

Good butcher cattle, cows, steers and heifers, were all in better demand, and prices a shade firmer. Export trade, however, is still inactive. The market is steady for good feeders, but easy for common light stockers.

The quarantine is now being strictly enforced at all points on the border, and this, it is expected, will help the best qualities of Ontario cattle, but may also cause some congestion of common and inferior stuff, which hitherto has had some outlet to the other side.

The run for yesterday and today included was 100 cars, with 1,221 head of cattle, 1,861 sheep and lambs, 1,250 hogs and 90 calves.

THANKSGIVING TRAGEDY

Intoxicated Man Seriously Injures Wife and Suicides.

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Edmund McCabe, an engineer, went home while intoxicated last night and ordered his wife who had prepared a Thanksgiving dinner, to get out and bring some beer, and be quick about it. She was lying in bed, and being frightened, pulled the bed clothes tighter about herself. The husband then fired two shots from a revolver, one bullet entering the woman's body below the heart, the other penetrating her side. He then shot himself through the heart and fell dead. The woman is unconscious at a hospital, but may recover.

GREAT PIANIST DEAD.

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Mrs. Rosalie Magnusson Lancaster is dead at her home in this city. Thirty years ago Mrs. Lancaster, then Miss Rosalie Magnusson, was considered America's greatest pianist. She was the pupil of Rubinstein in Vienna.

FINE NEW CRAFT FOR GREAT LAKES

Hamon's Successfully Launched Thursday at Collingwood.

Collingwood, Nov. 26.—A new era commenced in transportation on the great lakes when the steamer Hamonic took to the ways, and was successfully launched at 2:30 p.m. here today. In the absence of Europe of Miss Hays, daughter of Charles M. Hays, of Montreal, Mrs. Gildersleeve, wife of H. H. Gildersleeve, manager of the Northern Navigation Company, broke the customary bottle of champagne as the Hamonic sped on the ways to her first submergence in Georgian Bay.

Over ten thousand people witnessed the launch; many visitors arrived by special trains, prominent in transportation and railway circles, including G. T. R. Bell, general passenger agent, G. T. R., Montreal; J. B. McDonald, district passenger agent, Toronto; J. E. Quick, general baggage agent, G. T. R.; W. R. Tiffin, superintendent northern division, and P. J. Lynch, assistant superintendent, Allandale; R. L. Thompson, D. P. A., C. P. R.; Superintendent McDougall, of Duluth; J. Dymont, Barrie, and many other officials and visitors.

When the new steamer Hamonic, of the Northern Navigation Company, joins the fleet on June 15, 1909, the great lakes will float one of the finest ships in the world. The Hamonic is being built by the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company, and her fitting and finishing will be completed during the winter and spring in order to put her into commission at the opening of the season. When completed the Hamonic will be the very biggest type of her class in construction, carrying capacity, speed and passenger accommodation. Her dimensions are: Length over all, 265 feet; extreme breadth, 50 feet; gross tonnage, 5,500 tons. The whole ship from keel to trucks is strictly the work of Canadian engineers, designers and builders.

HAYTI ISLAND RED WITH BLOOD

The Rival Factions Executing by the Wholesale and U. S. May Have to Interfere.

New Orleans, Nov. 26.—According to a dispatch received today by the Picayune from St. Thomas, D. W. L. private cable advises there from Port-au-Prince that the wholesale executions are in progress both by the Government forces and the revolutionists. Persons who are suspected of sympathy with the insurgents are being summarily shot by order of President Nord Alexis. Panic prevails. The same course is being followed by the revolutionists, who have control of the southern portion of the republic. Every person in that section who sympathizes with the Government is promptly put to death when his sympathies become known to Gen. Simon, the leader of the insurgents.

It is the general opinion in St. Thomas that intervention by the United States is necessary to protect the life and property in Hayti.

Act Against the Dufferin Park Men

Toronto, Nov. 26.—The police have instituted proceedings against several men on charges of bookmaking at the Dufferin race track.

This morning Thomas and John Hare, Fred Allen and Michael Stack appeared in answer to a summons before Magistrate Denison. The information against them, sworn out by Chief Inspector Archibald, says that for the three months following the 27th of August, they did conduct a disorderly house, to wit, a common gaming house at the Dufferin Park track.

Hartley Dewar, K. C., who appeared for the men, asked for a remand till Tuesday, without electing or pleading. "The action of the police in this case is on a par with that in the Woodbine case," said the chief inspector. "You will remember that the crown's case broke down on the definition of the word 'place' when tried before the court of appeal. We have, however, secured additional evidence against those who made books at the Dufferin Park track, with the object in view of final the meaning of this word 'place,' and I think have made it much more definite."

Wagner Wins Auto Grand Prize

Savannah, Nov. 26.—The power of six-score horses, crashing and roaring in the cylinders of a flat Italian car, sent plunging over a course of 402 miles by the experienced hands of Louis Wagner, a Frenchman, today won the longest and fastest international automobile race ever run in this country. With three drivers who clung together from the very start, there was a fourth figure for a time, but a caprice of fortune sent him pitching from the road. Out of the mass of wreckage, Fritz Erle, who had been driving the German Benz No. 1, was taken out with a broken nose and a broken jaw.

Still the struggle continued, and it was not until the last minute of the last lap that the tide of victory turned to Wagner.

Nazzaro, the Italian driver, holder of world's records, who clung to a narrow lead for more than a hundred miles, found it necessary to change a weakening tire, and got only third place.

Hemery, in a German Benz No. 8, took second prize.

It was not until the official time was announced that the actual winner was known. Wagner hurled himself to victory by the slender margin of 56 seconds.

Wagner's time was 6:10:31.

Guelph Men at the Chicago Show

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Two thousand head of stock, leaving 1,000 more to arrive today, have been received here for the International Live Stock Exposition, which will open tomorrow. Exhibits were received during the day from the Iowa Agricultural College, the University of Nebraska, the Minnesota Agricultural College and Purdue University. Students will compete in the judging contests. Other colleges represented in the judging contest include the Ontario Agricultural College of Guelph, Ont., Only one farmer's son, J. G. Crounman, of Manhattan, Kansas, has entered the contest, and he will pit his practical knowledge against the theoretical experience of the college students for the J. Ogden Armour agricultural scholarship, amounting to \$5,000.

U. S. Gunboats Ordered to Shanghai

New York, Nov. 27.—A special dispatch to the Herald from Manila says that Consul-General Denby at Shanghai has requested Rear-Admiral Harber to send gunboats to Shanghai to protect American interests, and that in accordance with this request, the Helena will steam today.

Advices from Washington early today said that no word had been received at the navy department concerning such a request by Mr. Denby, but that Rear-Admiral Harber would take any such action proceed on his own authority, and not necessarily advise the department.

LYCEUM COURSE A GREAT SUCCESS

STREET RAILWAY

PAID ACCOUNT

City Received a Check Yesterday for the Sum of \$300 for Street Cleaning.

The board of works last evening received a check for \$300 from the London street railway, the last payment on the account of \$566 which has been standing against the company for some months.

"We certainly can use the money on some of the streets in South London," said City Engineer Graydon. "Some of the roads there are in fearful condition."

Mr. W. J. Anthistle applied for the return of the \$50 check deposited with his tender on the Cove bridge contract. He refused to carry out the contract after it was awarded to him.

The work was done by day labor, and as there was a saving of \$200 on Mr. Anthistle's contract price by this method, it was decided to return him the check.

A Cellar Complaint.

The complaint of John Wood, 28 Orchard street, that owing to bad drainage his cellar was flooded, was brought up by Ald. Stewart, and City Engineer Graydon recommended that a sewer be initiated. It was decided to refer the matter to Ald. Gerry and Ald. Rose with power.

The claim of Alex. Moore for \$6 for repairs to a bicycle, injured in a collision with a pile of lumber left on Victoria bridge, was ordered to be paid.

VOLVA WANTS \$1,000,000 TO BUY DOWIE LAND

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Overseer Wilbur Glenn Volva, of Zion City, will submit a proposition to Receiver Thomas and the United States Circuit Court, to purchase the entire estate of John Alexander Dowie, so that he and his followers may continue in undisputed possession of the municipality. It is hoped by Volva that \$1,000,000 can be collected among the followers of the faith with which to make the purchase, and efforts to this end are now being made.

HON. SYDNEY FISHER HONORED BY ITALIANS

Rome, Nov. 27.—The general assembly of the International Institution of Agriculture met in this city this morning, under the presidency of Camille Barrere, the French ambassador to Italy. The originator of the idea of the institute was David Tubin, of San Francisco, and the plan was sanctioned by King Victor Emmanuel. At today's session Signor Tittoni, the Italian minister for foreign affairs, was appointed president, and M. Muraviev, the Russian ambassador, and Sydney A. Fisher, the Canadian minister of Agriculture, were chosen vice-presidents.

DOG ROUSED MASTER

IN GAS-FILLED HOUSE

Saves Lives of Several, But Two Were Already Smothered.

Pateron, N. J., Nov. 27.—A leaky gas main resulted in the death by asphyxiation of two persons last night, and the serious injury to three others. Three children also were overcome by the fumes, and may die. The dead are: Peter Cunningham and his wife. The three who may die are: Joseph, May and Thomas Kelly, children of Mrs. Mary Kelly, and the injured Albert Eyer, George Parker and John Worker.

The leak in the gas main filled the cellars of houses on Newark avenue and Sussex street. Eyer was awakened by his dog Nero, and upon smelling gas, he and Parker and Worker, who live with him, began a search for the leak. They struck a match in the cellar, and there was an explosion. All three were painfully burned. The explosion led to an investigation. Neighbors found Mr. and Mrs. Cunningham dead in bed. They had been asphyxiated as they slept. At the Kelly home, Mrs. Kelly and her children were all unconscious from the fumes. They were removed to the hospital. Mrs. Kelly soon revived, but her children may die.

HIS SON ARRAIGNED

Banker Claims He Threatened to Take His Life.

New York, Nov. 26.—With his father Frank C. Hollins, head of a Wall Street banking firm as complainant, De Ruyter M. Hollins was arraigned in the night court tonight charged with having threatened to kill his father unless the latter paid over to him \$500 which the son demanded in the banker's Wall Street office today.

The banker appeared in person to press the charge against his son, and with him were the prisoner's mother, Mrs. Celine Hollins, and his sister, Mr. Hollins told the court he wanted information as to the condition of his son, and looking to the interchange of diplomatic notes definitely outlining policies of both countries in regard to the Pacific and China, have equal opportunity of finding credence among the newspapers here whose sources of information are generally excellent. It was declared today that such notes should actually have been exchanged at Washington, but inquiries at the foreign office, while failing to elicit a flat denial of the report, did not bring out a direct confirmation. The officials of the American embassy are also preserving a discreet silence.

These rumors are being widely discussed in Tokyo, and that the consensus of opinion tends toward a full belief that the pending exchange of such notes, is a well-founded report.

TEDDY THE BULLDOG "COULD DICTATE IS A HAPPY PUP TERMS OF PEACE"

Toronto Plasterer Saved Life of Animal at Cost of \$50.

This is the German Idea of Result of a War With England.

The Toronto Telegram says: Teddy, the bullterrier, is skipping about in William Moore's backyard at 254 Claremont street, just as if the shadow of the lethal chamber had never fallen upon him. But William Moore is \$50 poorer than he was yesterday morning.

William Moore is a plasterer, earning \$4 a day, and living with his family at 254 Claremont street. When he appeared before Ald. J. P. in the afternoon police court, at the instance of his next-door neighbor, charged with keeping a vicious dog, it looked bad for the terrier. Little Kate Kennedy went into the witness box and held up her hand, with the marks of the terrier's teeth in it. Mr. Kennedy also pointed to a spot near her eye, where once before the bulldog had attacked her.

Only When Teased.

But William Moore and Mrs. Moore insisted that the dog was not vicious. "The children tease him," said Moore. "When this occurred I was just coming to the door, and the little girl was poking her book at him."

Kennedy offered no denial when the owner of the dog said: "Mr. Kennedy's satisfied to withdraw the case," but his willingness was not proof against the advice of the court.

"I will send the dog to the country," said Moore.

"It won't do," said the magistrate.

Choice of Three.

Mr. and Mrs. Moore went away with the alternative of paying a fine, having the dog killed or going to jail; that is, the dog was to be put to death. They went home and talked it over, and the terrier was there. His name is Teddy, and they have had him since he was a pup two weeks old. He is part of the household. The Moores resolved that, whatever happened, Teddy must live.

He Paid.

So yesterday William Moore appeared before Squire Patterson and announced that Teddy was still alive.

"It will be fifty dollars or ten days," said his worship.

Moore went down to the clerk's office and paid over his fifty bucks, and when he got home the terrier almost turned himself inside out with enthusiasm at seeing him.

SHOT BY MISCREANT

The child told her mother, and when Mrs. Mahoney went to the shop to remonstrate with the cobbler, she was driven from the place. Then Mrs. Mahoney told her husband. His visit ended in the shooting.

UNCLE SAM AND JAP

TO OUTLINE POLICIES

Tokio, Nov. 26.—Persistent rumors declaring that negotiations are now in progress at Washington between Ambassador Takahira and Secretary of State Root, looking to the interchange of diplomatic notes definitely outlining policies of both countries in regard to the Pacific and China, have equal opportunity of finding credence among the newspapers here whose sources of information are generally excellent. It was declared today that such notes should actually have been exchanged at Washington, but inquiries at the foreign office, while failing to elicit a flat denial of the report, did not bring out a direct confirmation. The officials of the American embassy are also preserving a discreet silence.

These rumors are being widely discussed in Tokyo, and that the consensus of opinion tends toward a full belief that the pending exchange of such notes, is a well-founded report.
