Be Careful of the Water

Engineer Moore requests that the citizens be careful not to waste any water during the hot days.

The reservoir has fallen to 9 feet 6 inches, owing to the great demand and the falling off of the Springbank supply, and in order to allow it to catch up, it will be shut off this afternoon.

"The weather has been very dry, and as a result the springs are falling off," said Mr. Moore. "This happens every year, and is no more pronounced than prior to this season. The hot (weather increases the demand, and consequently there is more water used. The wells show the same flow, and no diminution is noticed. They are pumping regularly, and the weir shows the measurements agreed upon. I do not want to alarm the people, but I would ask them to be careful, and try and not use more water than is necessary. The demand will be great during the hot weather, and we want to conserve our supply as much as


