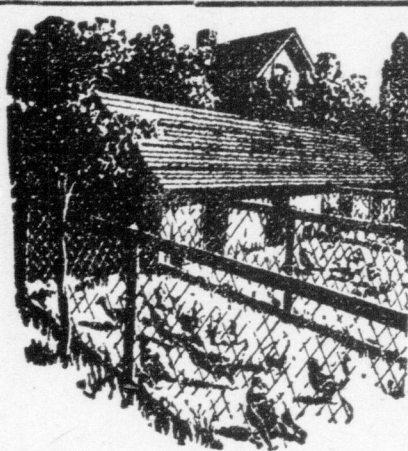

# OPERATORS GIVE IN A POINT COAL WAR MENACE VANISHES

### The Miners Are Asked to Submit All Differences to Roosevelt's Strike Committee, and Prolonged Tie-Up In Anthracite Field Is Avoided.

Philadelphia, April 10.—A settlement of the difference between the miners and the operators seem inevitable as the result of the conference held in this city today.  
The coal operators let down the bars of their absolute refusal to meet demands made by the United Mine Workers and offered to submit the entire difference to the anthracite strike commission appointed in 1902 by Former President Roosevelt.  
This offer was held in abeyance by President White, of the miners, until a sub-committee of the mine workers and operators can further discuss the nine demands made by the miners. This committee will again meet tomorrow in this city for the purpose of continuing their deliberations. Alvan Merkle, the largest independent coal operator, was elected chairman of the conciliation board.  
This committee will reconvene tomorrow at 2 o'clock and carefully go over the nine demands made by the miners with a view of reaching an agreement without recourse to the strike committee.  
If an agreement is reached the ten operators and ten miners will again meet and consider the findings. In view of a failure to reach a satisfactory agreement the general question of the strike committee will be considered.  
It was the general feeling tonight in the miners' headquarters that a satisfactory agreement would be reached. The bituminous miners voted on the proposition of the operators today and it is expected that they decided to accept.

## WARNING GIVEN TO THE BREWERS

### Amendments to License Act Prevent Storing in Local Option Towns.

## PAY CHECKS NOT GOOD

### Persons Intoxicated in Local Option Districts Must Tell Where They Got It.

Toronto, April 11.—Further restrictions upon the liquor traffic in places where local option is in force are disclosed in the proposed amendments to the liquor license act, which were made public in the Legislature yesterday afternoon. The law is being amended to provide that in a municipality in which no liquor shall be stored or kept by any brewer or other person whomsoever for future delivery to any person, notwithstanding that any portion of it may have been previously ordered or appropriated to a customer. Any brewer who contravenes this provision will be deemed to have kept the liquor for sale, without the license required by law.  
This clause is further amplified by declaring that any liquor not actually delivered to the person for whom it purports to be intended shall be deemed to be kept for sale, while any person who allows liquor, of which he is not the bona fide owner, to be stored on his premises will be guilty of an offence under the act.  
By another sub-section two gallons of liquor is the limit that any person can have in his possession in a local option municipality, except a chemist or person authorized to have liquor in his possession without any limitation as to quantity. Any liquor in excess of two gallons found in the possession of a person so unauthorized shall be an offence under the act.

## Can't Cash Checks.

Pay checks will not hereafter be legal tender over the bar or counter in a liquor shop. A clause is added to the present law prohibiting a tavern or shop licensee, or any person on his behalf, taking in payment of liquor or other goods any check or order for money issued in payment of wages.

## Reforming Spelling.

A meeting of the Ontario branch of the British Simplified Spelling Society was held, and the following officers were elected: President, Dr. J. Gibbon; Secretary, John Dearyness; Treasurer, Principal A. McQueen, London, Ont.; Committee, Prof. D. R. Keys, M. A. W. Scott, B. A., Toronto; Robt. Alexander, of Galt; S. Lane, B. A., of Ottawa; W. M. Metford, Toronto; Inspector D. A. Maxwell, of Windsor, and Alex. Hamilton, M.D., of Toronto.

## Amendments Voted Down.

Amendments by Colonel T. Mayberry (South Oxford), and J. Marshall (Monck) to the hydro-electric power bill and the municipal franchise bill, respectively, were voted down by the Government with little ceremony. The objections to the bills were the same as had been raised on other occasions. All three of Hon. Mr. Beck's bills were given third readings.

## ALL-DAY SESSION OF LEGISLATURE

### Liberals Present Amendments at Third Reading of the Highways Bill.

## GOVT. NOT UNANIMOUS

### Many Absent Themselves To Dodge Vote on Compulsory Vaccination Measure.

Toronto, April 11.—In order to hasten the conclusion of the session the Legislature spent the whole of yesterday from 11:30 in the morning until late last night in an endeavor to finish up all of the Government business. A large number of bills were dealt with, many amendments were moved to bills called for their third readings, and those amendments which were moved by members of the Opposition were promptly squelched by the House. There were two divisions during the afternoon on an amendment by Mr. Rowell to the highways improvement bill, and on an amendment by Dr. McQueen to the vaccination bill. The Government majorities were 55 and 45 respectively.

Toronto, April 11.—Ontario's educational system was subjected to criticism by several speakers at yesterday's session of the Ontario Educational Association. Prof. G. H. Needler, of the University of Toronto, indeed, declared it to be "a crime against the nation."

## May Amend Later.

Dr. Reaume assured the House that the Government was disposed to treat all municipalities alike. As the federal grant would not be available this year, the proportion of contributions will not be affected. Meanwhile, if it was found necessary to specify the amount, the act could be amended at a subsequent session.
