The six daily studies for this week constitute the International S. S. Lesson for next Sunday. Read the Bible Story on which this study is based, as you ponder the following questions:

Review—"The Things Which Are Not Seen." Reading Lesson, II Cor., iv., 1-4.

Golden Text—"We look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen; for the things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are not seen are eternal." II Cor., iv., 18.

The questions for this week may be used as an original lesson, or as a review of the twelve preceding weekly lessons. The date and title of each lesson, where found, Golden Text and one question from each lesson follow:

July 30—"The Word of the Cross." I Cor., i., 1; II, 5. Golden Text: "For he it is from me to glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." Gal., vi., 14.

5. Verses 1-8—If a true Christian is a laborer, or a lawyer, a minister or a miner, or of any other calling, or occupation, can he truthfully say, or not, and why, that he is in his present position by "the will of God?"

August 6—"The Greatest Thing in the World." I Cor., xiii. (Temperance Lesson). Golden Text: "Now abideth faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love." I Cor., xiii., 13.

Recipes Supplied By Cynthia Grey's Readers.

Ex-School Marm.

Hamilton Sauce.—2 ripe tomatoes, 12 large apples, 4 large onions, 2 red peppers or (3 green), 1½ cups sugar, 4 tablespoons salt, 1 pint vinegar. Chop onions, apples and peppers fine. Boil all one hour or until thick enough, and seal.

Smothered Chicken.—Cut young chicken up same as to stew. Dry it thoroughly and roll each piece in flour (put on all it will hold nicely), place in a covered baker, sprinkle pepper and salt over it. Pour over it one or two cups of sweet cream; if not, sweet milk and a piece of butter. Bake 1 or 1½ hours.

Jam Layer Cake.—2 eggs, 1 cup brown sugar, shortening size of an egg, 2 tablespoons of sour cream (or milk), in a cup filled up with jam, jelly, or any kind of fruit; 1 teaspoon soda, 2 level cups flour, seasoning to taste.
