When the Toronto Scottish played here in an exhibition game, London soccer fans thought they had seen the last sight of this year's first division football, but the London and District, in entering the Plenty Cup series and getting to the finals, have crossed up the dope somewhat. Even if the Plenty Cup does not land here for the winter months, the L. and D. will have furnished the fans with some of the best soccer available in the Dominion. That they have been able to do this in one short year of existence makes the future of soccer in London look particularly encouraging.

The long jumps made by the London team, finally ending with their two days' entertainment of Ottawa here was a big financial undertaking, and while the Ottawa series wasn't a money-maker, still the L. and D. will not be far short of the mark.

A mass meeting of the L. C. I. students today will decide whether the annual field day and track meet is to be staged at Queen's Park or as has been customary for years past, Tecumseh Park.

The move to Queen's Park will also mean a drastic change in the program. It will mean cutting out the annual rugby game between London and St. Thomas C. I., and the girls' basketball tilt.

The idea behind the move to Queen's Park is to make the track meet a real test of athletic competition, so that the game will be popularized at the school, and be at the same time a good preparation for the annual meet in the spring of all the secondary schools in this area. Tecumseh Park with its hastily and unofficially measured grass tracks, has not made the track events possible in the real sense of the word. No records could be shot at on the grass, either, which took the one big factor in track events away from the annual field day. At Queen's Park, it is argued, the athletes of the school will have a real opportunity to know what they can do under the usual track meet conditions.

The move for the abolishment of the rugby and basketball games, at least on the field day, is lack of time. Sufficient attention cannot be paid to the track events if rugby and basketball are allowed on the program. It seems like a good idea, even though it disarranges the program somewhat, and a few traditions go by the board. The games could be staged on another day, if necessary, but at any rate, if it is a choice between them and the track events for the good of the school and the future of the track game in the school, it would seem the games, which are in the nature of exhibitions, should go.
