TORONTO, March 1.-Niagara Falls and Kitchener will battle for the Intermediate O. H. A. champlonship and the right to enter the Cup elimination. Niagara Falls defeated Belleville tonight by 5 goals to 4 in a sudden-death, ten-minute overtime game at the arena. The teams had played to a tie in the semi-final round, the Falls winning in Grimsby, their own ice, 6 to 4, white Belleville in the East, 7 to 5. Tonight's game was to break the tie.

It was two evenly-matched teams that struggled through 70 minutes of strenuous hockey, and it was anybody's game. Niagara Falls deserved to win. They had only six good players, their substitutes being of little use.
