At the point where the collision there is an unobstructed view of Michigan Central tracks in each direction. With Engle, Webb and Leindner dead, it remained a mystery tonight how the driver had failed to receive the warning of the approaching train.

The truck was partly across the tracks when the locomotive hit it. It split the truck and trailer at the coupling, throwing the truck to one side of the rails, the trailer to the other. Engle closed his throttle. The engine came to a stop with a wrench that threw men, women and children n coaches tumbling about the aisles.

From truck and trailer the steel drums of high combustiles came toppling. Two of them landed on the cow catcher. There was a roar, and then a mass of flames that seemed, to panic-stricken onlookers who had fled from the cars, to envelop engine, truck and all.

Swallowed by Flames. Engle having halted his engine and saved from injury the passengers committed to his care, leaped next, Vebb followed through the cab window. Both were swallowed by the flames. Some of the men passengers ran forward and managed to drag the three men from the fire. Engle was dead, his body burned to a crisp. Webb and Leinder, still breathing

but unconscious, were placed in two automobiles and taken to the Eilbert Memorial Hospital at Wyandotte. The fireman died shortly after reaching the hospital, he never regained consciousness. His entire body was a mass of seared flesh.
