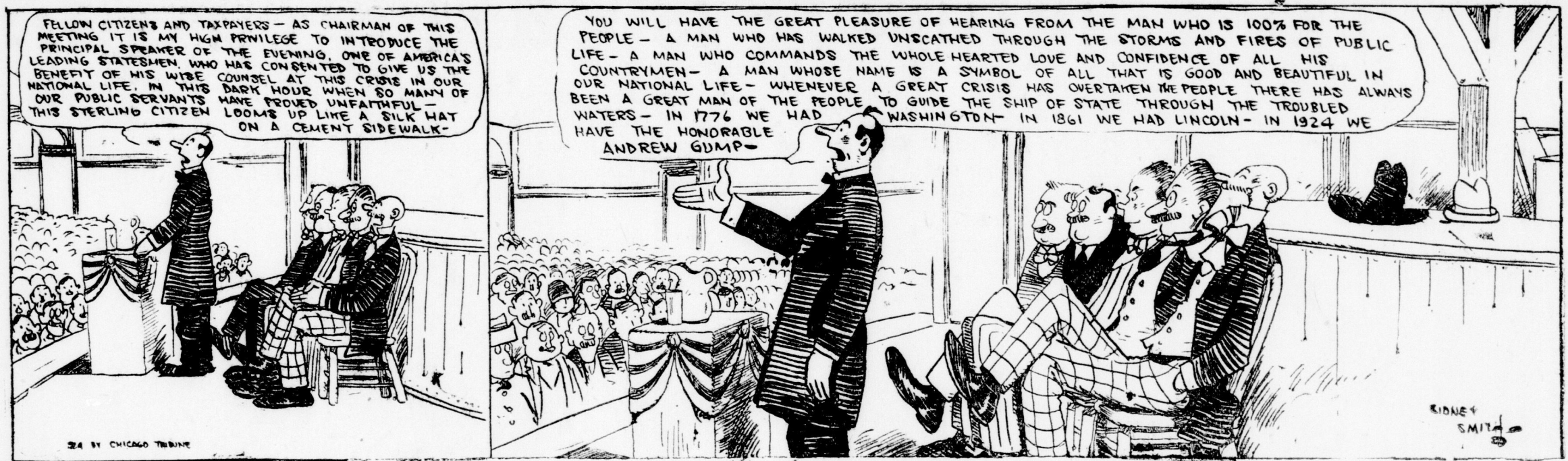

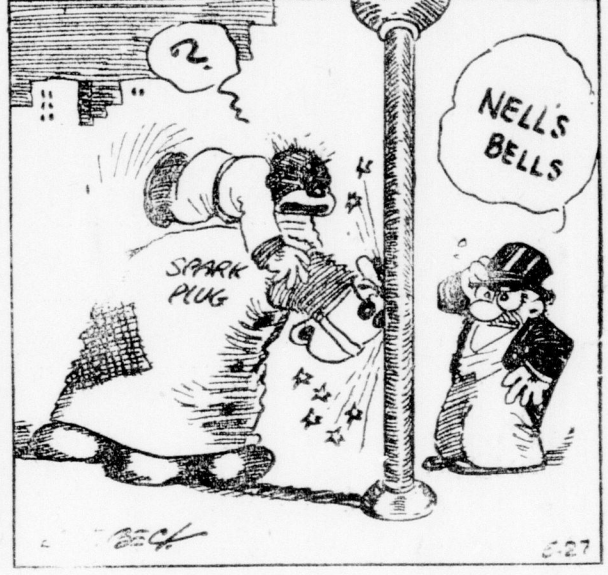

LONDON DEVELOPMENT
SURPRISES "OLD BOY"

James Dale Returns to the City
After Twenty-Eight
Years Absence.

James Dale, a native of Westmin-
ster Township, has returned to Lon-
don on a visit after an absence of
28 years. Naturally, he notes many
changes in London and the surround-
ing country, but expressed himself
as being more than delighted with
the progress noted in London.

"I knew London had grown, but
I had no idea it had developed into
such a splendid city," said Mr. Dale.
"You certainly have a city to be
proud of. Splendid stores, splendid
homes, and fine factories. It is one
of the ideal spots of Canada."

Mr. Dale, who has also visited his
other home, W. O. Dale of Dorchester,
took a prominent part in the birthday
celebration of his father, John Dale
of Westminster Township, last Fri-
day. Mr. Dale is hale and hearty
despite his 83 years, and enjoyed the
party, attended by 16.

In Canada's
Parliament

Canadian Press Despatch.
Ottawa, May 27.—Today—in the
House of Commons the budget ques-
tions dealing with income tax will be
considered. Civil service superannua-
tion, estimates for the department of
national defence and the department
of soldiers' civil re-establishment
will be on the order paper.

The senate resumes its sittings.
The deputy governor-general will
give royal assent to bills.

Yesterday—A bill to provide for the
use of the single transferable vote
in single-member constituencies when
more than two candidates are run-
ning, was introduced by Hon. Ernest
Lapointe, minister of justice.

Most of the day was taken up by
the House of Commons in committee
debating budget resolutions regard-
ing the sales tax. Some additions
were made to articles exempted from
the tax and several amendments
moved by Conservatives were defeat-
ed. The greater part of the resolu-
tions were passed, but some clauses
remained for further consideration.

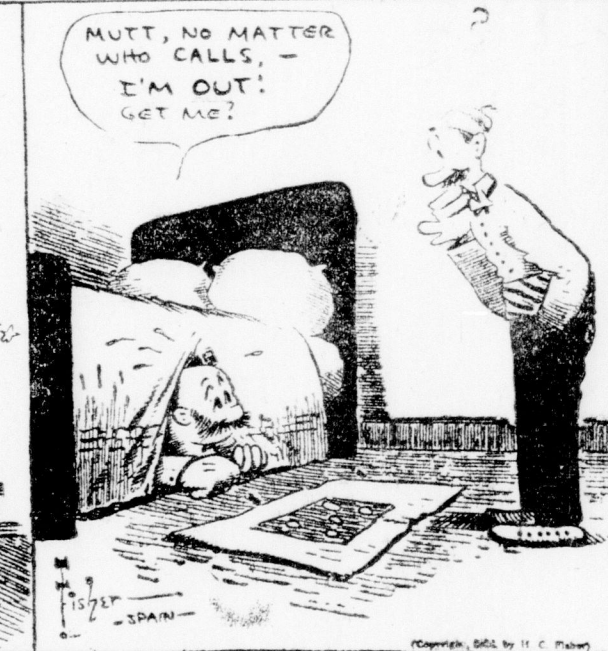
