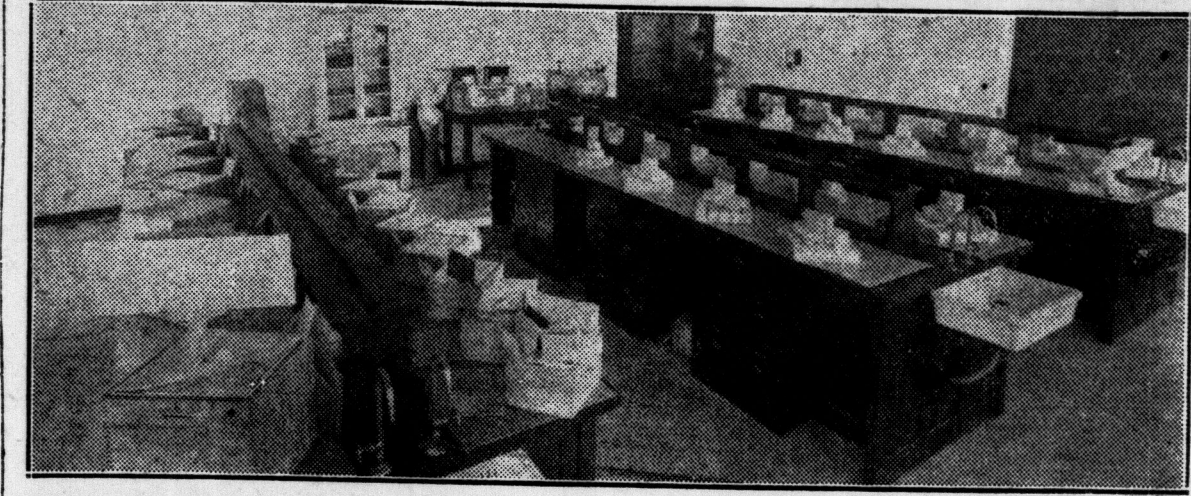
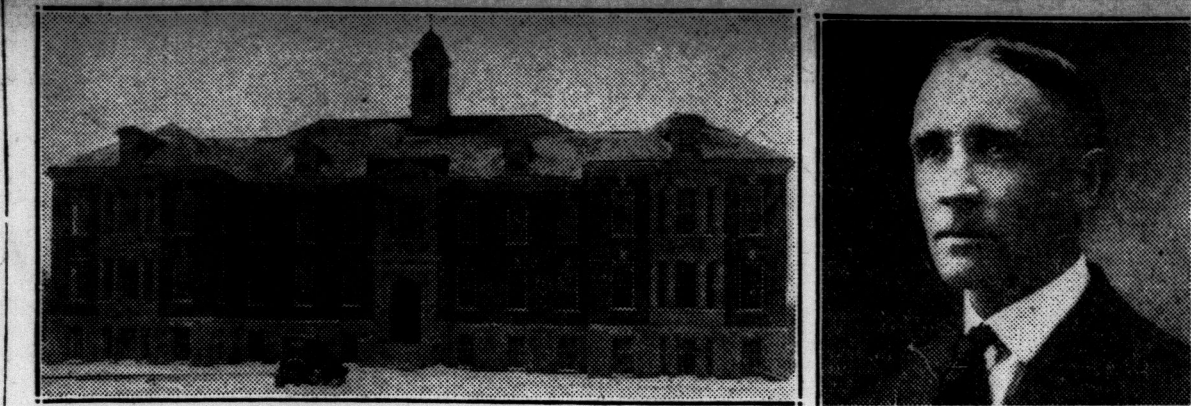

SMALL SHIP BATTLES WAY ACROSS ICE LAKE

Crew of Stephen Chase Has An Exciting Passage.

GOES INTO DRY DOCK

Owner Will Attempt Sarnia To Harbor Beach Return Trip.

Sarnia, Jan. 13.—Limping its way, disabled, 60 miles across Lake Huron in a blinding snowstorm and forced to buck giant windrows of ice, the fishing tug Stephen Chase moored here yesterday after a thrilling passage from Harbor Beach, Michigan.

Fort Gratiot light, which has been dark since December 20, burned again Thursday night so that Captain Oscar Hurkett and his crew of three men aboard the Stephen Chase might find safe passage into the icebound mouth of the St. Clair River, but it was daylight when the vessel arrived. The story of the fishing tug's 60-mile passage of Lake Huron in January, fully a month after even the hardest of lake craft have forsaken its dangerous waters for the winter, is one of a game struggle against wind and waves, of a dogfight fight waged by a little ship with a broken propeller shaft and a damaged stern bearing, against hazardous odds of ice and snow. Leaving Harbor Beach Thursday at 8 a.m., the 78-foot fishing tug battled for an hour in the ice-laden harbor at the beach before getting into the open lake.

Because the wind was blowing southwest at the time, Captain Hurkett anticipated an easy passage. Previous telephone messages had assured him that the southern end of Lake Huron was comparatively free of ice, and that a lane could be readily cut through the thin coating which he might find. When the tug was off Forester the wind shifted southeast, and at this point the passage assumed a hazardous undertone.

Especially the Mail says it cannot be denied that the imperial government was at fault. Will Attempt Return.

The last several miles of the trip consumed more time than did the previous distance of the passage. Finally when the entrance of the river came in sight Captain Hurkett took a detour and steamed slowly into safety. He expects to put his boat in dry dock for machine repairs, which will take about a week to complete. A return passage is then to be attempted for Captain Hurkett, fisherman for the last 42 years, is anxious to return to Harbor Beach while the fish are still running.
