

**FRENCH GENERAL
RALLIES PATRIOTS**
Former Leader of French
Armies Exhorts Followers
To Organize.
POINTS TO DANGER

Associated Press Despatch.
Paris, Dec. 9. — General Edouard
Castelnau, former commander of the
French armies in France and Bel-
gium, and now president of the
recently-organized patriots' league,
whose purpose, it was announced,
was to "defend the rights of Cath-
olics, law and order in France," today
issued the following appeal:
"The hour is grave. Subsidized by
foreigners, a certain element is openly
preparing for the explosion of a vast
plot, evolved by terror and massacre,
proposing to condemn France to the
abominable servitude of a regime
which provoked in Russia anarchy,
ruin and death. Against this peril we
must not simply wait, whine, discuss
and criticize.
"United, organized and resolute,
good citizens of France have now
frequently referred in the Chamber
of Deputies and in other public speeches,
recently as 'a clerical menace.' The
premier emphasized that this organ-
ization was 'just as dangerous as the
Communists.'
"The patriots' league is the organ-
ization to which Premier Herriot had
seriously declared the magnitude
of the danger from the movement
of the extremists of the left had been
aggravated, and some insisted that
the real peril came from the activity
of the reactionary clerical organiza-
tions.
"Communism is not capable of de-
stroying law and order in France,"
declared M. Herriot. "The Commu-
nists amuse me when they talk about
forming a peasant bloc. The worst
they can do is to provoke military
orders, with collisions and blood-
shed, which will be promptly re-
pressed.
"On the other hand I hear that the
Action Francaise people are very
active. We have proof that decisive
action is being prepared by them;
that orders have been issued to buy
blackjacks and revolvers. These at-
tacks will find the government
ready."

QUEBEC APPLAUDS FIGHT.
Canadian Press Despatch.
Quebec, Dec. 9. — An echo of the
religious combat between the Herriot
government in France and the Roman
Catholic church, following upon the
omission in the French budget of
any provision for supporting the
French ambassador to the Vatican,
and the program of the Herriot ad-
ministration to substitute the church
schools in Alsace by sectarian
schools, has been a repercussion in
Quebec as indicated by a communi-
cation addressed to the cardinals of
France by Cardinal Begin, arch-
bishop of Quebec.
Cardinal Begin deplores the threat
to withdraw the vatican embassy and
declares that the present is no time
to undermine the influence of the
church, since "resolute hands" are
taking away from the "capitol" the
sacred symbol of our salvation.
Applauds Struggle.
His eminence applauds the struggle
being waged against the anti-clerical-
ism of the French government, and
assures the faithful in France of
the prayerful support of Catholics
in Canada.
The communication in part reads:
"Your eminences know the depth of
sympathy which joins up—the Can-
adian descendants of the old
French families—to Catholic France.
The grave events now being enacted
in your noble country cannot leave
us indifferent, and if we experience
a feeling of sorrow at the thought of
the violent attacks threatening the
Catholic church in France, we note,
on the other hand with a lively
pleasure, that the faithful, moved
and directed by pastors who are as
zealous as they are vigilant, are
laboring to organize a dignified and
proud resistance in defence of their
religion.
"Already our Franco-Catholic jour-
nals of all shades of opinion, echoing
the courageous letter of your emi-
nence and other French episcopal
communications, have greeted this move-
ment with great acclaim. On his part
the honorable prime minister of the
province of Quebec, Mr. Taschereau,
in a sympathetic message to
France, has not hesitated to pro-
claim what Canada owes to Catholi-
cism, and what Catholicism repre-
sents as a social force in every coun-
try."


Regret Changes.

motherland, my sorrow—and that of
all French compatriots in the Catholic
world."
