Rev. B. Ketchen of Hamilton Speaks of Beck's Death in Sermon.

In a powerful sermon delivered at the New St. James church yesterday morning, Rev. Beverley Ketchen, of McNabb street Presbyterian church, Hamilton, paid tribute to the late Sir Adam Beck, alluding to his life as a conspicuous and noble illustration of service.

Rev. Mr. Ketchen confined his ad dress to an explanation of the quality of service, interpreting Biblical history for its analysis.

"That very honorable citizen of London who passed away last night, Sir Adam Beck, was a very conspicuous and noble illustration of service," Mr. Ketchen said. "There were few men in the public life of Canada more admirable than he. In the face of terrific and constant opposition, and in the midst of the most unintelligent and unfailing criticism, he gave himself unstintingly to the service of the people of this

"His service, of course, has never been fully appreciated, but the day is coming when his worth, the greatness of his achievements, will be recognized, and monuments will be erected in honor of the memory of a great disinterested statesman.


