Seeds From Which Narcotic Is Derived Came From Mexico, Says Prisoner.

New York, Nov. 10.-That a drug ing actually has under cultivation good-sized patches of public park property and private woodlands in the city of New York and its environs and is growing the outlawed narcotic hasheesh was the amazing story told yesterday by a Mexican boy, who was sentenced to prison after having been arrested with a quantity of the drug in his possession. hailed "hero of the banquet" by Pre-mier Baldwin at the historic feast of

Some time ago, the boy told investigators, a group of Mexicans came to New York with the seeds of the cannabis indica, from which hasheesh is derived, and secretly planted plots of it in Astoria, Queens, along the Boston Post road in Westcheste county, and in various secluded spots in Central, Bronx, Van Cortlandt and Prospect parks. Tucked away in obscure corners, it escaped notice and grew to maturity. It was then clandisposed of at immense profit.

Room Full of Dope. The prisoner, Andres Huerta, who gave his age as 24 and his address as the Seamen's Church Institute, 25 South street, had a grip full of the dried leaves in his room, sufficient for 10,000 cigarettes of the drug. 

Mr. Pinchot brought about a settlement of the anthracite controversy two years ago, and many observers of the present situation expressed the opinion that he would make a strong effort at least to bring the two sides together again in the conference room.

Governor Pinchot has been in daily touch with the suspension since the 158,000 miners laid down their tools on Sept. 1. He has conferred several times with Rev. J. J. Curran, rector of St. Mary's Catholic church, Wilkesbarre, who figured prominent-ly in the settlement of previous years coal strikes, and discussed the situa-

tion with both Mr. Lewis and Major linglis in September.

Recently, optimistic statements re-garding the end of the suspension were made by both the governor and Eather Curran. Interests outside of the anthracite industry affected by the shortage of coal are known to have been active in urging the state executive to take a hand in the sit-uation.
