GLENCOE AND LONDON CREWS TANGLE AGAIN

Visitors Here All Tuned Up After Victory Over Sarnia.

LOCAL JUNIORS IMPROVE

Holding Woodstock Crew To 1-0 Score Lends New Courage.

London and Glencoe exchange games tonight. The intermediates of the Scotch village, all tuned up after their usual win against Sarnia, make their first appearance here, while London juniors are guests of the village lads.

Glencoe, now that they've some games under their belts, will give the locals a hard bit of going tonight. They were in great form against Sarnia Friday night, and against London over a week ago set the locals a fast pace, although the game is practically thrown out. Glencoe has been knocking at the door for group honors for many seasons, and they've still got a great chance.

Win Means Much. If they could pull off a win here tonight they'd put the first lap of the group standing in more of a tangle than it is at present.

London Intermediates, although they got two bad periods out of their systems Friday night against St. Marys, showed to better advantage in the third, and if they can start where they left off in that mix their spotless record will be maintained tonight. They have only to win tonight, and even if they lose the remaining game away in Sarnia on the first half of the schedule, will be leading to go into the last lap.

Juniors Hitting Stride. Sandereck of Paris, formerly of Woodstock, will handle the game here.

About the same time as the rule was changed Canadians worked a deal with the Saskatoon Crescents of the Western Canada League, which sent Eddy ("Newsy") Lalonde out west and made Aurel Joliat a member of the Flying Frenchmen. It was hinted that the increased waiver price was prompted by the owners of the N. H. L. clubs who would not swing a deal involving Lalonde without boosting the waiver price so high as to make it certain that none of the N. H. L. clubs would show a desire to take him.

It was the only way to get Lalonde out of the league, and it proved the proper caper.

The new price of \$1,500 has helped Hamilton and Toronto. It has also hurt a bit, as far as Hamilton is concerned.

It enabled Percy Thompson to sell George Carey, "Cully" Wilson and Leo Reise to western clubs. It also made possible the sale of Harry Cameron of Toronto St. Pats, to Saskatoon.

But if it hadn't been for the fancy price demanded via the waiver route the Hamilton club would have been able to sell both Reise and Wilson to clubs in the N. H. L. for a fair figure. Ottawa would have been glad to take Reise, and the Senators were also said to be willing to pick up Wilson. They wouldn't, however, have paid anything like \$1,500 for either.

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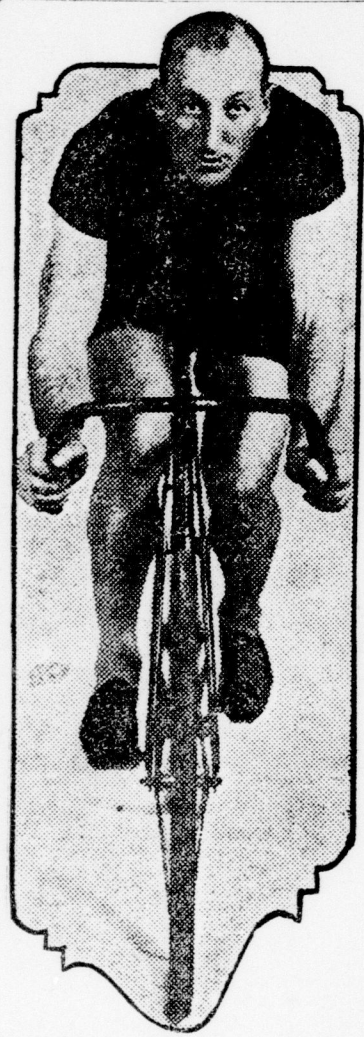

Beat Varsity's Fast Cage Quintet in Thriller Saturday Night.

BETTER TEAM WORK

Western U. cagers justified the predictions which have been made about them by defeating Toronto Varsity in the opening Intercollegiate game at the Armories Saturday night by a score of 28-16, and in decisive fashion.

Nearly 1,500 fans saw the debut of the Purple and White team, and were rewarded with a great exhibition of the court game—tricky, clever, passing, hard, clean checking and good teamwork. Varsity worked a long passing game, while the Western out-It slipped down the floor with short passes. Both teams appeared inaccurate on the hoops, but the close checking made it look that way.

Eighteen—eight was the count at half-time, and Western increased the pace in the last half, according to the figures, by outscoring the visitors 12-8. However, Varsity was actually putting up a better game in the last half and combining better, whereas in the first spasm, the Purple and White had the Varsity passers bewildered with intercepting, and were camped down under the Toronto hoop with good chances to score all through the period.

Toronto Center Good.

Hungerford and McGuire, the two center men, had a neat tussle in mid-floor. The London lad led the Western attack, with George Wainwright hooping several nice points. Quinn Acquires Four Players From Cleveland in Exchange.

Associated Press Despatch. Boston, Jan. 13.—President Robert Quinn of the Boston American League Club, has confirmed reports of two deals which he said would materially strengthen the Red Sox. To Boston will come Bobby Veach, outfielder from Detroit, and Catcher Steve O'Neil, Second Base and Outfielder from Cleveland. George Burns, first baseman, and Al Watters, catcher, leave Boston for Cleveland.

President Quinn said the acquisition of Veach was through an out-of-pocket cash deal, but the amount of money involved was not made public. The Cleveland deal, he said, was a trade with no cash figuring in it, merely an exchange of three Red Sox players for four from Cleveland.
