2. That the bills which the city neglects, or r fuses to pay, were incurred in arresting the spread of smallpox, and wee incurred within the scope of duty, and under the authority of the Municipal Health Officer, in the persons, either of Dr. Milne or Dr. Wade.

3 That under the Health Act, the city's expenses, in arresting the spread of smallpox, are to be paid out of the general taxes.

Hence, if, as you say, the city is prepared to pay the expenses incurred by it "in due course," it would have paid the bills, upon presentation, out of the general taxes and ordinary revenue, instead of (as has been done) putting the applicants off upon the protext of passing a \$75 000 io n by-law for health purposes, none of which loan, even if passed by the rate-payers, could legally be applied in payment of the smallpox bills, so far incurred.

The city having repudiated its health obligation, it has been deemed in the public interest that the Government should advance, and pay the bils. The money expended in so doing will the collected from the city, under the rules.
